We had just a little more rain at the end of April to make a total of only 11mm for the month against an average of 38.9mm. Records show only 11months with less rain in almost 25 years we have been recording. There were also some further frosty nights. Orange and Almond Pudding Cake

Ingredients:

2 large or 3 medium oranges
6 eggs
250g caster sugar
250g ground almonds
1 tsp baking powder
Knob of butter
Flour and icing sugar for dusting

Method:

Wash whole unpeeled oranges and place in lidded pan with just enough water to cover, boil for 2 hours. When cool enough to handle, cut them open and remove pips. Tear the oranges into food processor and blitz to a puree (this can be done 24 hours in advance)

Heat oven to 180C/Fan 160C/Gas mark 5 Lavishly smear a 23cm spring form cake tin, or one with removable base, with the butter. Dust with flour and shake out excess.

Using a hand-held electric whisk or processor with a whisk attachment, whisk the eggs with the sugar until pale and fluffy. Stir in cooled orange puree, ground almonds and baking powder to make a thick batter.

Place prepared tin on a baking sheet and pour in mixture.

Bake 45-60 minutes, checking after 45 minutes, until the cake is risen and firm as opposed to wet.

Cool in the tin before turning out, reversing the cake so the bottom becomes the top.

Dust with icing sugar and serve.

It is also good topped with blueberries or raspberries served with cream or crème fraiche.



Annual Parish Council Meeting and Annual Parish Meeting - 9th May 2017

- Cllr Robert Walton was re-elected as Chairman and John Kirk elected as Vice-chairman
- Cllr Brian Deacon has resigned from the Parish Council due to ill health. He was thanked for his efforts on behalf of the village An Official Notice of the vacancy thus created is posted on the Village Noticeboard if you are interested in joining the Parish Council
- No response has been received from Network Rail in relation to the concerns over the state of the railway bridge at Arch Hill. It was suggested that Suffolk County Council Highways Department should be informed
- Cllr Soons agreed to pursue the issues of potholes and blocked village drains
- Suffolk County Council has informed the Parish Council that a recent speed survey has taken place on Bury Road. The clerk will ask for clarification about the findings
- Better Broadband Suffolk have indicated improvement work within the village should now be carried out between September and December 2017
- Motorbikes have been using the restricted Sheepgate Lane. Please report any sightings
- Complaints have been received about a vehicle parked on Village Hall land by the Water Treatment Plant
- A member of the PCC has carried out repairs to the single gate leading into the churchyard. This has been repeatedly vandalised
- Concern was expressed about dog fouling along village footpaths
- The Parish Council recorded its thanks to all the parishioners and local farmers who continue to cut verges in the village. This helps to improve visibility and road safety. The Highways Department schedule for cutting verges is inappropriate for the growing season

Arable Farming at Bishops Farm



Drought for two months and then a 57mm two day deluge of rain saves crops! After writing two months ago about the effect of the weather on farming it has been highlighted over the past two months. A week ago crops were looking very stressed, suffering from drought with harvest prospects poor.

<u>Winter Barley</u> looked very good in the Spring, wet weather in February delayed applying nitrogen fertilizer until March. The nitrogen uptake into the plant was reduced by the continuing dry weather. Fertilizer granules need rain to dissolve the fertilizer into the soil so the plant can absorb it via its roots into the plant. This did not happen resulting in die back of tillers (side shoots), which will reduce the yield of the crop at harvest. All fertilizer and fungicide spray have been applied and the crop is in full ear (heads showing), so we need a balance of sun and rain during flowering and to fill the grain.

Winter Wheat is looking good. Being later in its growth cycle it was less affected by the dry weather. Wheat suffers from numerous fungal diseases that are reduced by dry weather so we have less spraying to do on this crop. A fungus called Septoria is present in our KWS Lili variety on the lower leaves and is spread by rain splashing onto newly emerging leaves. The other variety we grow, KWS Siskin has no disease at all totally due to inbred disease resistance of the crop and the dry weather. One more application of fertilizer to go on the wheat; nitrogen to increase the protein in the grain for milling where the requirement is between 12-13% protein.

Spring crops suffered with the dry weather. After planting the soil dried out quickly resulting in poor germination and emergence due to the searching East winds.

<u>Sugar Beet</u> Only 20-25% of the crop germinated and emerged then the weekend rain of 6mm brought up another 30%; the remainder laying dry in the soil until the welcome rain of last weekend. Now thankfully the remainder are appearing; two small leaves pushing out of the ground! However, the weeds have continued to grow but because half of the sugar beet plants are very small, what herbicide can be applied without

damaging the small sugar beet. We have just started tractor hoeing the crop, which should kill some of the weeds between the rows of beet. <u>Spring Beans</u> These germinated and emerged well as bean seed is planted deeper – 75mm. However, the field between the Old Rectory and the railway bridge has been plagued by rooks eating the germinated bean seed, an acre of the field has very few been plants. I will re sow this area now the soil is moist. The cold weather has meant we have very little leaf damage from insect pest - pea and bean weevil – so have not had to spray an insecticide on the crop yet.

Spring Barley germinated and emerged slowly and sporadically due to the dry weather. Spring barley is very susceptible to extremes in weather and shows signs of stress very quickly. Dry conditions cause it to go a light yellow; growth of the plant slows down and can stop. Its leaves are also prone to disease. Black spots appeared on the leaves, a disease called Ramularia, which weakens the leaf allowing secondary infection of mildew. Lack of rain, nitrogen uptake and cold resulted in a very sick crop. Two sprays of magnesium and manganese foliar feed improved the leaf colour and a further spray of fungicide to kill the leaf diseases resulted in the crop improving. When plants are under stress the response is to flower and seed before the plant dies, so our yield of barley will probably be reduced. Thankfully the rain came and crops will continue to improve as we move towards harvest. How quickly the year passes! Thank the Lord for a lovely rain.
