Bradfield St Clare Parish Council - 13th February

The Parish Council was pleased to welcome to the meeting, Councillor Karen Soons, Councillor Sarah Milday-White and PC Mark Ellis who is the Safer Neighbourhood Team Officer.

- PCSO Mark Ellis reported that to date in 2018 there had been no reported crimes in Bradfield St Clare
- Councillor Karen Soons has been in contact with Jane Storey (Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Highways) in connection with the need to agree the start and finish points for the speed limit on Bury Road and Felsham Road and for a clear indication of the costs of implementing the speed limits
- The blocked drains near the Water Tower and the Anglia Water pumping shed were once again discussed – these have been reported many times with no action taken
- The two lighting units at the junction of Bury Road and Felsham Road have once again been reported under report number WEB036291
- West Suffolk has introduced new national planning fee regulations; raising application fees by 20% from 17th January 2018. Money raised will be reinvested in Planning Services improvements
- Following a recent inspection by the Care Quality Commission (CQC), West Suffolk Hospital has been rated 'Outstanding'
- Church Lane has an increasing number of deep potholes. The
 clerk will check to see if the lane is an adopted highway.
 Concern was also expressed over the serious degrading of the
 verge at the entrance to the lane. Many of the other village
 verges continue to be eroded. A recent chimney fire has
 raised the issue of the difficulties caused by cars parked on
 the road in the village when safe access through the village is
 required, particularly by emergency vehicles
- Some fly tipping has occurred on Bury Road. A litter pick in the village was proposed – a date will be agreed and advertised. A copy of the full minutes can be read on the Parish Council website: www.bradfieldstclare.onesuffolk.net



A message from Suffolk Trading Standards

PAYMENT SURCHARGE BAN

From 13th January 2018, businesses are no longer allowed to charge consumers for paying by debit card, credit card or electronic payment services (e.g. PayPal, mobile 'phone apps)

The ban on surcharges does not apply to commercial debit or credit cards. Companies can continue to set a minimum spend limit before a card is allowed to be used to complete a transaction, and many more may start to introduce this.

The law only applies to consumers and so businesses CAN still be charged fees using a business credit or debit card, but as is the case currently, this should only be the amount it costs to process the transaction.

If a company tries to charge you a fee simply because you are choosing to pay by card, you can refuse, and should report it to Trading Standards via 0345 040506

Arable Farming at Bishops Farm



Where do we go from here?

Happy New Year everyone! As we start a new calendar year and the Brexit clock is ticking away, there is uncertainty in the agricultural industry. At the risk of boring you all silly, I will try to explain why we all feel so nervous about the whole process and the eventual outcome.

Since joining the Common Market in the 1970s, farming has been a relatively secure industry with free trade between ourselves and the rest of the European Union. With the Common Agricultural Policy there has been a sense of protection to our industry by quotas for some products; sugar beet, milk and potatoes and contract litres for milk. Also we have had subsidies for arable production to encourage growing more wheat, barley, sugar beet etc. In years when World Commodity prices have been low, the subsidy has supported the industry and helped farmers maintain a sustainable income. More recently there have been environmental subsidies to encourage farmers to take poorer land out of food production and to plant these areas with wild flower/grass mixtures to encourage birds and insects to form new habitats.

At present all the support mentioned above will eventually go after Brexit. Our current Minister of Agriculture, Mr Gove, has said he will provide some environmental subsidies but has given no indication of any production subsidies, quotas or guaranteed prices for our products. Where do we go? What do we grow?

As a country we are not self sufficient in agricultural products. We import large quantities of most commodities from Europe. Most of the milk consumed in the UK is imported from France, Germany and Holland. During the 1980s the EU offered inefficient dairy farmers a financial grant to give up milk production (£500/cow). Many large UK farms sold their dairy herds. Strutt and Parker Farms had herds of 200 plus cows at Great Livermere and Thorpe Moreaux. These dairy herds all went. Before joining the Common Market all the farms in

Bradfield St Clare were mixed farms all having animals and all having herds of dairy cows. Now we are losing our last Jersey herd. It is a sad situation.

The once mixed countryside has change; grassland ploughed up to grow wheat, feed wheat for animal feed – millions of tonnes to feed pigs and poultry. Much of this has been exported to Europe while we as a nation are not self sufficient in milling wheat for making bread and biscuits; we import most of this.

Then comes the question of import/export tariffs after Brexit and what rate of tariff will be applied (7-12% has been mentioned). This would be an extra cost of production if exporting our products to Europe. Also most of our fertilizers and chemicals are produced in Europe and we assume would have import taxes applied to them. Who knows?

I am not saying we all return to mixed farming but I do feel we should produce what can be consumed within our own country and we should try to become more self sufficient in our own food production.

Enough of my ramblings and politics! On the farm we are preparing for Spring. Hopefully, as the fields begin to dry, the first applications of nitrogen fertilizer can be applied onto the overwintered crops of wheat and barley. Then as soil temperatures rise the crops will have sufficient nutrition to grow rapidly. This job needs to be done in the next 10 days, weather permitting!

Spring barley planting usually happens around 15th March and sugar beet planting between 20th to 25th March. It all depends on the weather; sunshine and drying wind are required.

The last of the 2017 wheat has just been sold. Milling wheat has gone for export on a boat out of Ipswich. We have planted another new hedge from the Rectory to Arch Hill doing our bit for the environment. Hopefully it will grow as successfully as last year's did. Another large 'hill' has appeared at Bishops Farm as a 400 tonne stockpile of Anglian Water sewage sludge has been delivered. This will be spread after harvest without too much pong – let's hope! As we wait for the dry weather, machinery maintenance continues so when conditions improve all our equipment will be ready to use. As the first crocus and daffodil flowers appear, the warmer days of Spring are not far away.
