



Latest News from Pitchers Green Farm and the Bungalow!



All the cattle are now out on grass and this week has seen them start to look better. When they first go out they have their winter coats, then they look like the moths have been at work - really scrubby – then the bloom that comes with the new grass growth and warmer temperatures; this is when I own up to them being my cattle. With the weather being so changeable it seems to have taken a long time this year – 30C one day, 8C the next. Days of rain and frost etc. It does however give me something to moan about!

I am now back to milking 1 cow, Kirsty (if you are reading this Kirsty please take note). Nicola who calved in March (her calf died) was milking very well, so rather than waste the milk I bought two baby calves with the idea that I could put the calves to suckle her in the field with her doing all the work, a fool proof plan. She was having none of it and after 4 days of haltering her, putting her behind gates, extra feeding and some very special "chats", I had to admit defeat. There was no way she was going to let the calves suckle so it was back to milking her with the machine and pouring the milk into buckets for the calves. She then developed a "pea" in her teat or I believe it is called Lacteal Calculi, which is formed from calcium phosphate form the milk deposited around a piece of shed epithelial tissue – a "pea" is a lot simpler! As you put the milking machine onto the cow, in this teat the "pea" is drawn down and stops the milk from coming out, acting like a bung. Sometimes you can hand milk with two fingers holding the "pea" up and out of the way, the other hand milking, but this didn't stop mastitis setting in, so after 3 treatments she was sold. Now Kirsty is being milked for the two calves and house milk which is fine, however as the weather has warmed and the grass has grown, Kirsty has ideas well above her station. One morning she came into the parlour to be milked entered the stall and decided to reverse out quickly knocking the gate over onto the

milking machine breaking one of its wheels and causing much chaos. We have daily trials now she is in a 4 acre field with the gate in one corner and if she doesn't want to come in to be milked we can cover every blade of grass in the field. I do tell her she won't win in the end but she just smiles knowingly.

Finally a big thank you to everybody for the cards and well wishes now we have finally moved. There is still a lot of unpacking sorting to be done but we've found the kettle, tea bags and milk (thank you Kirsty). Also thank you to the village litter pick team for their hard work in cleaning the verges and ditches which fell off the front of the pallet on the must have tractor!
