

News from Home Field



Boiled Fruit Cake

This is my twin sisters recipe' she got from a relation, I can also remember years ago my Welsh mother-in-law making this cake regularly. You can change the ingredients to suit your preference I sometimes add glace' cherries or chopped apricots.

Boil the ingredients below for 5-10mins in a large saucepan. 6oz raisins 6oz sultanas 6oz sugar – caster, soft brown – your preference 2oz mixed peel 4oz margarine/butter, I use Flora Light One cup of water

LEAVE TO COOL

Dry ingredients: 4oz of plain flour 4oz of self - raising flour 1 teaspoon of mixed spice 1 teaspoon of cinnamon 1 teaspoon of bi – carbonate of soda Pinch of salt 2 beaten eggs Line a cake tin with greaseproof paper to stop cake sticking, round or square

Bake for 1 1/4 hours approximately at 160°C perhaps bit lower for a Fan Oven.

Check half way, I add a piece of foil or greaseproof paper to the top of the cake so not to get too baked.

I always double up the quantities and make two cakes.



The main news this month is that Kirsty my official 'house cow' is still with us. During mid-August, when the weather was hot and the flies were bothering, she managed to cut her teat quite badly cutting it ³/₄ of the way around. I think she kicked at the flies on her udder and caught her teat, so obviously she had to be repaired. With daily bathing and iodine spray she healed without antibiotics and inspite of the flies she now only milks on 3 quarters but gives a little milk so the big decision looms again - it was so much easier with 40 cows to manage, it wasn't quite as personal. Down at the farm with Kirsty are 10 in-calf heifers (pregnant with their first calf). The first heifer to calve is Adele in mid-October, so it is time for them to be sold in order for them to settle into their new surroundings. "Back in myday" (I can say that now), the heifers close to calving would be put through ther parlour about a month before their due date to get them used to the different movements, noises and most importantly where the food was. After calving (hopefully a heifer calf) comes the unpredictable part – will she let her milk down? Will she kick like a donkey? Will she be just like her mother? Will she be a record breaker? And if she is, why haven't I got 20 more like her?

On the fields up the road are 15 other cattle comprising 4 Aberdeen Angus cross Jersey and 4 Jerey steers (castrated males) who will all eventually go for beef. There are then 7 Jersey heifers who will be artificially inseminated at about 16-18 months old to calve at just over 2years (9 months gestation) – that's my grand plan, no doubt there will be some twists and turns on the way.

Linking the twists and turns is a certain sheep named Lucy who thinks herself as one of the cattle. She came to us as an orphan lamb 16 months ago, her first summer at grass was with the baby calves behind an electric fence; no problem there. When she came in last autumn for the winter I thought she would appreciate her own field (the front lawn with electric fence and shelter). She was having none of it and went through the electric fence she had respected all summer and went off to the cattle yards to join her 'buddies'. She stayed there all winter and was turned out with them in the spring, hence the reason for 15 cattle and 1 sheep. She often gets knocked about by the steers in the group who are 4 times her size and I feel sorry for her. Then you turn around and she is making use of her 3 horns (one snapped off`) to restore the status quo. Debbie and I are off to the cinema tonight to see a film about a pig that thinks it's a sheepdog. The film is called 'Babe' and is totally fictional I think!
