Bradfield Weather

The final days of November brought a further 12mm of rain, to make 66mm for the month against our average of 61.1mm. In early December there were a few wet days and it turned significantly colder in mid-month. There was rain just before

Significantly colder in mid-month. There was rain just before Christmas but alas, no snow and the month finished with 56mm of rain compared with our average of 53.4mm.

The end of 2018 completed 26 years of weather records for the village. 2018 produced 557.5mm (22inches) of rain compared with an average for the 26 years of 609.9mm. The year was the driest since 2013.

To date this winter we have had a couple of short, cold spells, but in the New Year temperatures have been above the norm for the time of year until this week. The cold weather arrived with a brief flurry of snow and now this morning a temperature of -6C. It has been relatively dry with only 9mm of rain, with an average for January of 50.9mm.



Easy-Peasy Chocolate and Cranberry Cookies

Makes 10-12 cookies

Ingredients 135g unsalted butter 80g caster sugar 80g soft light brown sugar 1 egg 1/2 tsp vanilla essence 190g plain flour 1/2 tsp salt 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda 100g dried cranberries 60g white chocolate chips

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170 C and line two baking sheets with baking parchment
- 2. Cream together the butter and both types of sugar, using an electric mixer, then break in the egg, add the vanilla essence and mix well together.
- 3. Sift together the flour, salt, cinnamon and bicarbonate of soda, then add to the creamed mixture in two batches, mixing well until a dough forms. Then stir in the cranberries and chocolate chips.
- 4. Break of pieces of the dough about two tablespoons in size, roll them into balls and place on the baking sheet, allowing five or six cookies per tray. Spacing them about 7cm apart to allow for them to spread!
- 5. Bake for 15-20 minutes or until the cookies are light golden on top. Leave on the sheets for about 10 minutes to cool and set before transferring to a wire rack.

You can bake these to your preference, slightly chewy or crispier! Substitute the cranberries and chocolate chips for whatever you fancy! Raisins, smarties, chocolate chunks or nuts!

Arable Farming at Bishops Farm



Happy New Year to everyone!

As we start a new year with very little rainfall to date, the legacy of last year's hot summer still affects farming and the countryside. None of our field drains are running and there is very little water in the ponds and ditches. Unless we have significant rainfall over the rest of the winter, another hot summer could be disastrous.

The clay soil of Bradfield St Clare needs to become saturated during the winter to hold enough moisture to sustain plant growth during a hot summer. The clay acts like a sponge. When it is full of water it expands and the excess water leaves the field via the drains and into the ditches. This is known as field capacity and we are a long way off that yet.

The autumn sown wheat and barley crop are very advanced in growth for the time of year as up until this week, temperatures have been mild – 10 to 11C, so plants have continued growing. Cold spell are advantageous in two ways to farming. Frosts of -4C kill some pests, green fly, aphids and also kill some fungal diseases such as mildew. The other benefit of a sharp frost is that it fragments the ploughed soil, breaking the clay lumps so in the spring it is easier to produce a fine seedbed for sowing barley and sugar beet.

As the crops have grown well over the winter, one of the first jobs for the spring is applying nitrogen fertilizer. The crops will have used most of the residual nitrogen in the soil left over by last year's crop. Soil nitrogen is also boosted in the autumn on fields where we applied sewerage sludge and where this year's wheat crop follows last year's peas and beans as in this case nitrogen in the soil is fixed by the legume root nodules. When wheat and barley has depleted the residual nitrogen in the soil the leaves begin to yellow and the potential yield of the crop will be reduced. It is important to apply fertilizer as soon as possible.

We have two Spring crops to plant this year. A malting variety of barley called Laurette and sugar beet. We aim to plant barley around

15th March if the weather and conditions allow and sugar beet a weak later.

The uncertain political climate still affects farming with the dreadful ongoing Brexit negotiations. A no deal ending would be disastrous with possible immediate loss of subsidies, tariffs on exports and imports of chemicals and fertilizers.

As many of you know, in November we sadly lost our employee Dan. After four years of training and working with me on the farm, he has gone to work on a large farm at Feltwell on the edge of the Fens. We wish him every success in the future. I will continue to farm on my own most of the year with help at busy times from our son Tom and maybe even get Lorraine on a tractor! Also a big thank you to people in the village who have offered their help. I will call upon you if and when I need help — many thanks one and all.

Problems with Sheepgate Lane are still ongoing. Recently quad bikes were spotted using it at 8.30 at night. No damage was done but the lane is a restricted byway NOT for use by motor vehicles. The Police have been informed and CCTV will be installed to catch further misuse that may occur. If anyone sees the lane being abused please let me know or any member of the Parish Council. Let us enjoy this lovely green lane for walking and riding and hopefully catch the offenders.

I have applied for new hedging to plant beside the new ditch that was dug in the autumn and some to plant on the south side of Sheepgate Lane where the lane crosses the open field. There is a shortage of young hedging this year due to the hot summer last year, so we are unsure if the planting will be done this spring or in 2020.


Looking forward to some decent rain and then a warm and sunny March and April. I am sure everything will sort itself out, maybe even the political issues.
