I ended last month's report talking of the arrival of a cold spell, which culminated with a couple of centimetres of snow lasting no more than two days, before turning to rain and higher temperatures. January produced only 21mm.of precipitation against an average of 50.9mm, the driest January since 2006.

There has been the odd wet day or so in February to date, with 26mm of rain with our average at 43.75mm. The main feature however, has been the very mild temperatures into double figures, with 14C forecast for the end of this week. Snowdrops, crocuses and daffodils are well in evidence which gives the feeling that Spring might well be on the way. 

TASTY SHORTBREAD FINGERS

Originally from a Flour Cookbook, but it was too sweet for us, so I tweaked it a little!!

Ingredients:

9ozs plain flour Pinch of salt 2 ozs caster sugar 6ozs COLD good, salted butter

Method:

Mix flour, salt and sugar.

Cut cold butter into small cubes then quickly rub into the flour, as lightly as possible.

Draw mixture together into a ball and knead until smooth.

Roll out to about 1/2 inch

Cut into fingers, prick through with a fork, and place on a greased baking sheet

Bake at 160C, 325F, Gas Mark3 for 20-25 minutes until light golden colour



There is now a vacant role as Village Recorder for Bradfield St Clare

You will also be invited to attend an annual Recorders Conference where there will be talks and displays on relevant subjects and where you have the chance to meet other Recorders. Bradfield St Clare Parish Council -12/02/2019

All the councillors attended the meeting and were joined by three members of the public.

- It is expected that UKPN will disconnect the old lighting unit and the junction of Bury road and Bradfield St George Road and connect the new unit on the same day
- The Parish Council will raise a formal complaint with Suffolk county Council Highways Department in relation to the remaining blocked drainpipe on Bradfield St George Road
- The parishioners who attended the meeting expressed their disappointment at the exclusion of the five dwellings on Bury Road from the proposed 40mph speed limit. Following a site visit with a Highways officer, the Parish Council had requested an extension of the speed limit coming from the direction of Cockfield to commence before the houses at the corner of Bush Green Lane. This request was refused but an extension of the 30mph speed limit on Bradfield St George Road was agreed from this junction to the properties just beyond the water tower.
- Signs at the entrance of Sheepgate Lane have at some time been moved and a footpath sign broken. The Council has received a letter with information that once again Sheepgate Lane had been used for inappropriate purposes – possibly by quad bikes. P.C. Fox will be in touch with the Public Footpaths Officer to discuss a way forward to improve the situation whist acknowledging that the lane is a public right of way
- Local crime figures were shared. Our village has a very low recorded figure
- Changes to SCC School Travel Policy were discussed. Parents and Carers now need to opt into the service for their children
- All unregistered footpaths and bridleways need to be registered by 1st January 2026. The Clerk will obtain footpath maps for our location. The footpath warden has been informed
- A planning application to remove and reinstate some internal aspects of Bush Green Farm were discussed
- Parish elections will take place in May 2019

News from Home Field



It was our first Christmas in the bungalow this year, which was a bit different apart from the usual bounty of family and food (thank you Debbie!) My routine was getting up, down to the farm, milk Kirsty (still here), feed the silage, the walk back to the bungalow. No problem there but what do you do then? It's such a long time before you are allowed to open presents. Thankfully the weather was kind but no white Christmas for the after dinner pictures. We had a few frosts and a little snow, which didn't hold the dread they used to, with only two troughs to thaw and so long as the tractor will start to pull the silage out it's a doddle! I hope I haven't tempted fate as I do have a memory of driving our old Nuffield tractor and trailer from the farm across the fields up to the Mouse House corner to pick up one tonne of chicken feed from a delivery lorry who couldn't get any closer to the farm because the wind had blown all the snow off the field into the road and blocked his way. We don't seem to get the hardness of the weather we used to but with all the tales we still have to take what we are given.

I had my Farm Assurance visit in mid-February for the Red Tractor stickers, which accompany all the cattle leaving the farm. The last audit was before the cows moved out so when the assessor rang up to make an appointment he went through his check list and said, "I see you were milking 35-40 cows on my last visit. How many are you milking now?" "Just one for my cornflakes" I replied "as I don't sell milk anymore and don't have the same number of animals." – I thought the audit would be a lot simpler and quicker but there were still a lot of guestions to be answered and points to clarify. The Red Tractor Farm Assurance is a good scheme to ensure a consistent level of standards and conditions across the country, which helps to enhance the confidence of the end purchaser. However we spent half an hour looking at the cattle, conditions etc., then over one hour filling in computer forms all totally necessary but not my 'cup of tea'! Three in-calf heifers have gone to Suffolk Cheeses to begin their working lives. All three are due to calve in March, namely Amanda, Britney and Beyonce – the last two must have been named during my "Down with the Kids" period. Nowadays it's not so much getting "Down with the Kids" as getting up again afterwards!
