# Spiced Banana Cake

200g bananas (the riper they are, the sweeter the cake will be)

270g muscovado or light brown sugar

2 eggs

280g plain flour

1 teaspoon baking powder and bicarbonate of soda

1 teaspoon ground ginger and ground cinnamon

½ teaspoon ground mixed spice

140g butter - melted

Grease and line a loaf tin 23cm x 13 cm (mine is about 4½" x 7½" and about 2½" deep).

Beat eggs and sugar until well mixed.

Mash the bananas and beat into the mixture.

Sieve the dry ingredients and mix into the banana mixture until well incorporated.

Pour in the butter and beat the mixture until all the ingredients are mixed well.

Pour the mixture into the tin and level the top.

Bake <u>about</u> 1 hour Gas 3/170°C/325°F or until knife/skewer comes out clean.

This cake freezes really well.



# **News from Homefield**



The big decision regarding Kirsty my 'final' milk cow (never say never again) has been made. She has been sold along with a heifer Annie, who I could not get into calf. Twice she was inseminated and lost her calf at 4 months (9 months is the normal gestation), so there comes a time when you have to cut your losses. The day Kirsty left was the first day in 11 years I had not milked a cow so there was a big void in the day without this routine. However the biggest problem has been buying milk. "A dairy farmer buying milk!" has been heard jokingly several times and then there is the problem of which milk to buy – full fat, semi-skimmed, skimmed, etc., etc. I honestly didn't realise there were so many varieties to choose from, so Debbie and I are currently taste testing to see which milk can fill the gap and so far none have come close, so maybe 'final' is too soon!

Six beef cattle have also been sold as store cattle. They will be fattened on summer grass then sold for slaughter in the autumn. There were two Jersey steers, Alan and Brian and four Aberdeen Angus X Jersey – 3 steers Bing, Brooza and Barry and Beauty an Angus heifer. As their new owner only had a small horsebox and the animals were quite big, it was decided to make two trips. I brought the six into the old courtvards and then sorted three into a smaller pen with a gated race to guide them into the horsebox. The pen is next to the big barn, which has an old front door (complete with letterbox) that leads into the barn up a 2ft high straight step. It used to be used for carrying bags of feed through to fill the feed hoppers in the milking parlour. I know this door was shut fast when I put the three steers into the holding pen but somehow they opened the door and stepped up into the barn and had a lovely time roaring around the empty barn with me chasing after them trying to persuade them to go back through this small doorway and down a 2ft drop. When the game had finished I looked into the heritage of these steers and wouldn't you know it? Brian is the son of Pru who has appeared in the Grapevine before for many misdemeanours, as has Tinkerbell (the Morley garden incident0 - all the same family! - read more in The Bradfield Grapevine issue

122 – Christmas/New Year 2014/15. I think I know who opened that door!

At Homefied I have ploughed up a small allotment to try to be more self-sufficient (nothing to do with Brexit). I say a small area but it's not until you plant the first two packets of broad beans that you appreciate how many more packets are needed to fill the area and also more area for weeds to grow but the veg should taste good – just got to sort the milk situation now.
