## Carrot Cake With Cream Cheese Icing

#### **Cream Cheese Icing Ingredients**

450g cream cheese, softened 50g butter, softened 250g icing sugar (sieved) 5ml pure vanilla extract

#### Directions

In a medium bowl, cream together the cream cheese and butter until creamy (don't over mix as it will break down the cream cheese). Mix in the vanilla extract and then gradually stir in the sieved icing sugar. Store in the fridge until ready for use.

#### **Cake Ingredients**

275g plain flour

1 teaspoon salt

3 teaspoons cinnamon

1 teaspoon baking powder

2 teaspoons bicarbonate of soda

4 eggs

400g soft golden caster sugar

350ml vegetable oil

375g grated carrots

125g chopped walnuts

125g sultanas

#### **Directions**

- 1. Preheat the oven to 160C /Gas 3.
- 2. Lightly grease a 20cm cake tin.
- 3. In a large bowl, combine flour, salt, cinnamon, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda.
- 4. In a large mixing bowl cream together eggs and sugar. Add oil.
- 5. Slowly add pre mixed dry ingredients and blend together well.
- 6. Add carrots, walnuts and sultanas.
- 7. Pour into cake tin and bake for approximately 50 minutes. Check after the first 40 minutes to see if a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean. If not, continue to cook, checking every 10 minutes.
- 8. Cool cake.
- 9. Once cake has fully cooled either top with the cream cheese icing, or cut cake in half and ice between the layers.
- 10. Enjoy! Lucy Barton





#### **Bradfield Weather**

The pattern over the past week or two has been of below seasonal normal temperatures, but still not very much rain. A little more in the latter days of April, to give just 11.5mm for the month against an average of 38.9mm, compared to 68.5mm in 2018.

There has been, in early May, one day of significant rainfall (13.5mm) to cheer gardeners and farmers and since then more bits and pieces here and there, to total 29.5mm to date with the monthly average at 52.3mm. In the past day or so daily temperatures have been improving and with another Bank Holiday due this weekend sunny days with 20C temperatures should be quite acceptable to all but the aforementioned gardeners and farmers.

### **Arable Farming at Bishops Farm**



#### All looking good so far!

As always I link my ramblings with Keith's observations of the weather. After a particularly dry April it was welcome to have 20-25mm of rain in early May from showers, albeit with some hail and one wet day of steady rain. Then further rain earlier this week. Thinking of weather one wonders how true two old country sayings are; "Don't cast a clout till May is out". That means cold weather continues through May and don't put your winter clothes away. Very true this month with several night frosts. The second saying, "Oak before ash only be a splash. Ash before oak bound to be a soak." Well, oak has come before the ash and with the press predicting a BBQ summer; we will wait to see what happens.

How quickly the year is going, despite the cold nights the crops are growing well. Winter barley is in full ear, all fertilizer and sprays applied and will be ready for harvest in about eight weeks time in mid July. The barley is disease free, healthy – just needs sun and rain to fill the grain. Wheat also looks very good. Wheat has a lot more fungicide and fertilizer applied than barley. At present I am spraying T2 fungicide, which is designed to keep the top two leaves of the plant disease free. The top leaf known as the flag leaf and leaf two are responsible for filling the grain. Ears will start to appear on the wheat about 5<sup>th</sup> June. No matter what weather we have, ears appear around the same date each year, the development being governed by day length. After then a further spray is applied to keep the developing grain free from Fusarium Mycotoxin fungus. Harvest for wheat is usually mid August.

The sugar beet crop has been slow to get established this year due to cold nights. Now it is growing well. With April being so dry only about 70% of the seed germinated, the remainder came up in early May. These later plants will catch up and make sizable roots. Another old saying is "A good crop of sugar beet should touch in the row by the Suffolk Show and across the row by the longest day." I think they will be a bit behind that this year.

The other problem this year has been the removal of chemical seed treatment; neonicotinoids being banned by the EU has meant there is no control of soil borne pests from attacking the germinating seed. These pests are wireworm, eelworm and millipedes. We have had a problem down Sheepgate Lane that had grass on last year. Wireworms have eaten a lot of the seedlings on about an acre of the field. Another pest that eats holes in the leaves of young plants is pygmy mangold beetle. The sugar beet do recover from this damage. However our biggest problem is early invasion of green aphid that was controlled by seed treatment. The green aphid transmits a disease called virus yellow causing yellowing of the leaves by destroying the chlorophyll (the green pigment) in the leaf so that the plant cannot produce the sugar to be stored in the root. We will now have to spray the crop two, maybe three times more to control the aphids. At present we are spraying sugar beet to control broadleaved weeds, then another application to kill blackgrass and then a further spray of trace elements and bio stimulants. After all of that I will tractor hoe the crop to kill any weeds that have survived the chemicals. The winter beans are in full flower with the first pods already formed. Beans are an easier crop to grow, only requiring two fungicide sprays - one at early flowering done in early May and the second three weeks later. The diseases controlled are chocolate spot and marsh spot.

Let us hope the weather continues to provide sun and rain in June. Although everything looks well at present, a prolonged period of temperatures in 80C plus coud be disastrous as we do not have reserves of water in the ground after such a dry winter and spring. However, we are always blessed with a seedtime and harvest.
