The main feature of the last part of August was another period of very hot weather, which covered another Bank Holiday. I can't recall we have had a wet holiday weekend in 2019. Only a splash more rain completed a total of 27.5mm for the month against an average of 64.3mm.

In the first week of September the temperature dropped significantly with a little rain but has subsequently become much warmer again with temperatures above the normal for the time of year. There has however been a distinct lack of rain with a total to date of just 8.5mm with our average at 47.5mm. Potential heavy rain at the past weekend in fact barely registered in the gauge. 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How to give a CAT a pill:

- Pick cat up and cradle it in the crook of your left arm as if holding a baby.
 Position right forefinger and thumb on either side of the cat's mouth and
 gently apply pressure to cheeks while holding pill in right hand. As cat
 opens mouth pop pill in to mouth. Allow cat to close mouth and swallow.
- 2. Retrieve pill from floor and cat from behind sofa. Cradle cat in left arm and repeat process.
- 3. Retrieve cat from bedroom and throw soggy pill away.
- **4.** Take new pill from foil wrap, cradle cat in left arm holding rear paws tightly with left hand. Force jaws open and push pill to back of mouth with right forefinger. Hold mouth shut for a count of ten.
- 5. Retrieve pill from goldfish bowl and cat from top of wardrobe. Call spouse to help.
- Kneel on floor with cat wedged firmly between knees, hold front and rear paws. Ignore low growls emitted by cat. Get spouse to hold lead firmly with one hand while forcing wooden ruler into mouth. Drop pill down ruler and rub cat's throat vigorously.
- 7. Retrieve cat from curtain rod, get another pill from foil wrap. Make note to buy new ruler and repair curtains. Carefully sweep shattered figurines and vases from hearth and set to one side for gluing later.
- 8. Wrap cat in large towel and get spouse to lie on cat with head just visible from below armpit. Put pill in end of drinking straw, force mouth open with pencil and blow down the drinking straw.
- 9. Check label to make sure pill not harmful to humans, drink a beer to take away the taste. Apply plaster to spouse's forearm and remove blood from carpet with cold water and soap.
- Retrieve cat from neighbour's shed. Get another pill. Open another beer.
 Place cat in cupboard and close door onto neck to leave head showing.
 Force mouth open with dessert spoon. Flick pill down throat with elastic band.
- 11. Fetch screwdriver from garage and put cupboard door back on hinges. Drink beer. Fetch bottle of Scotch. Pour shot, drink. Apply whiskey compress to check to disinfect. Toss back another shot. Throw T-shirt away and fetch new one from bedroom.
- 12. Call fire brigade to retrieve cat from tree across the road. Apologise to neighbour who crashed into fence while swerving to avoid cat. Take last pill from foil wrap.
- 13. Tie front paws to rear paws with twine and bind tightly to leg of dining room table. Find heavy duty pruning gloves from shed. Push pill into mouth followed by large piece of fillet steak. Be rough about it. Hold head vertically and pour 2 pints of water down throat to wash pill down.
- 14. Consume remainder of Scotch. Get spouse to drive you to casualty, sit quietly while doctor stiches fingers and forearm and removes pill from your right eye. Call furniture shop on way home to order new table.
- 15. Arrange for RSPCA to collect cat from hell and ring local pet shop to see if they have any hamsters.

Arable Farming at Bishops Farm



"All is safely gathered in."

- and we are already preparing to plot next year's crops. Firstly I must apologise for not writing in the August issue of The Bradfield Grapevine. Anyway I am back with a resume of what's been going on at the farm. When I wrote in the June issue we were looking forward to harvest. Luckily we had 100mm of rain in June that meant all the developing grains filled to maximum providing us with a really good harvest. Winer barley was harvested the last week in July and yielded just under 4

Winer barley was harvested the last week in July and yielded just under 4 tonnes/acre; good bold quality grain. This was a feed variety for animal feed. We sold this as soon as it was harvested and it went to Ipswich Dock for export to Spain and Portugal where the barley harvest was very poor this year. On 5th August we started harvesting the Zyatt winter wheat, a superb crop again yielding 4 tonnes/acre and good quality with protein and Hagberg (rising quality) suitable for bread production. Hopefully this will be sold for December movement.

Next the beans were harvested on 11th August, earlier than usual. The hot weather in early July killed off the green leaves and ripened the beans prematurely. The crop still yielded 2 tonnes/acre but the beans were stained and contained some Bruchid beetle, so only good for animal feed this year. The price however was very good at £200/tonne, so a good result. The rest of the wheat Siskin was harvested the last week of August, again yielding 4 tonnes/acre. This is a low grade milling variety suitable for biscuit manufacture.

This year I sold two consignments of wheat on the futures market well before harvest. It's a bit like big time gambling but it has paid off this year as the difference in price has dropped by £20-£30/tonne from when I sold it. The spring barley also yielded very well at 3.3 tonnes/acre. However the nitrogen content was a bit high this year at 1.7%. I have still to sell this for malting. Although we put very little nitrogen on the crop it was not taken into the plant until the rains in June, meaning the nitrogen then went into the grain rather than growing the plant.

We must be thankful for such a good harvest. Prices have dropped for wheat by £35-£40/tonne from last year's high but there is so much more wheat on the market not only in this country but also across the world. The price of grain is governed by the Chicago Commodity Market and greatly


influenced by the USA Department of Agriculture yield predictions for maize and wheat. World climate change also affects the market. The major producers are USA, Russia, Canada, Argentina and Australia. A deficit in any of these countries influences world market prices. Currency exchange rates and global politics also reflect on world grain prices.

Since harvest there has been very little rain but we have continued to prepare land for Autumn planting of next year's crop. Flat lifting the tramlines to remove wheeling compaction from last year's spraying the fertilizer applications. Hedge cutting, ploughing and rolling fields for next year's winter barley and wheat crops. Then these fields have been disced and rolled again to break the dry, hard soil. Luckily 12mm of rain over the last two days has helped soften the ground and I will start planting winter barley this weekend and wheat next week.

A big thank you to John Kirk for helping me with rolling and preparing the fields this Aurumn. Also thanks to David Rowe for helping remove the hedge at the bottom of Church Lane. Thank you to James Cole for allowing us to do that - it certainly has improved the visibility exiting Church Lane. I hope you all enjoyed our Harvest Celebrations – we have so much to be thankful for again this year.
