Christmas Memories



England has been my country for 45 years now and my memories of Christmas are somewhat fuzzy. With memories being very selective, I only remember the best bits as fleeting images passing through my mind.

My early years (till 9) were spent in Algeria and Christmas there was muted for obvious reasons and anyway, it was too warm to really feel the traditional atmosphere and be festive. As a family we gathered round the fireplace and put some cotton wool and live candles (no health and safety then) on some imitation Christmas tree but it was simply too warm and we quickly retreated to the garden to sit in the sun.

We came back to what we called Metropolitan France just before Algeria's independence. That winter of 1961/62 was the coldest in years and we endured weeks of ice and snow. So, it was at last my first white Christmas surrounded by a large family.

The Christmas festivities started in the evening of the 24th for 'Le Reveillon' (the Reveillon is a dinner held before or after the Midnight Mass and is repeated on New Year eve) always oysters, foie gras, escargots, sometime white pudding and cheeses. The 'piece de resistance' was the 13 desserts, which symbolise Jesus and the 12 Apostoles, some desserts were simple with dry fruits, biscuits, creme brûlée, chocolate mousse etc....but always a Bûche de Noel (Yule log).

This feast was followed in some families by going to the nearest or warmest Catholic Church for midnight mass.

The next day we would start all over again soon after midday. The main event being a turkey or goose pretty much like here in England. As a child I was only allowed a small glass of Champagne and a drop of red wine to colour my glass of water but I did catch up in the later years!

CHRISTMAS BISCOTTI



200g Plain flour 50g Self-raising flour 220g Caster sugar 2 eggs Vanilla essence – to taste. I like lots 50g raw unsalted pistachios 50g dried cranberries or cherries

Whisk sugar and eggs together well until combined. Add flours, essence and fruit and nuts.

Knead dough on a heavily floured surface.

Form into two logs about 12 inches long.

Bake on oven tray for 30 minutes at 180C, 350F, Gas 4

Cool for ten minutes then slice diagonally using a serrated knife into ½ inch or 1inch slices. (A bread knife is ideal)

Place slices on tray in single layer and bake again at 150C, 300F, Gas 2 for 30 minutes or until dry and crisp, turning over halfway through baking.

Perfect for dunking in your coffee!

Variation

Gingerbread biscotti – add 1tsp cinnamon, ¼tsp ground cloves, 3tsps ground ginger. Can add chopped ginger in syrup.

I was 7 years old in 1939 and up to then Christmases had been pleasant, happy but uneventful events but all that was about to change. This 1939 Christmas was spent in a deconsecrated but not renovated nor modernised old Methodist chapel right on the tip of the Gower Peninsula in Wales. My family lived in Surrey right under what was to become the flight path of the German bombers and not far from the coast where the invasion was expected to occur. My father, who had served throughout WW1 had signed up for the territorials. They were the first to be called up and in fact he went off on the Friday prior to the declaration of war on the Sunday, in our bright yellow little Austin Seven tourer (known as the 'yellow peril') with three friends to operate a searchlight unit on the Isle of Grain in the Thames Estuary. The wife of the senior partner in the firm where my father was a junior partner had very recently acquired for the princely sum of £50 the said chapel and offered it to us the use of it to evacuate ourselves. So off we set early on Saturday morning with a few possessions in a couple of suitcases, collecting my aged grandmother on the way - driven by a friend in an Armstrong Siddeley on our way to deepest, darkest Wales! We drove non-stop, our aim being to reach the Aust-Chepstow car ferry crossing of the River Severn; no road bridges in those days. We arrived late in the evening to see the last ferry just leaving, so undaunted we detoured

Having come from a relatively modern house for those days – my grandfather had it built for Ma and Pa as a wedding present in 1930 – the shock was considerable to put it mildly. No running water, water collected from the stream – no loo, just an earth closet in a shed in the yard. Electricity – yes! Cooking in another shed on an ancient electric cooker. The only heating in the chapel was an enormous tortoise stove in the middle of the cavernous hall, either burning hot or freezing cold. Neither my Mother nor Grandmother had ever laid or lit a fire in their lives. There were no partitions of any kind, a low stage at one end with a curtain on which we slept – two iron bedsteads and a camp bed for me. My 3 year old sister slept on top of a mattress on a chest of drawers! There was a trestle table and old deck chairs to sit on. No curtains at the high windows; two small areas curtained off containing a washstand with a jug and bowl for our ablutions – that was it!

via Gloucester, arriving in the wee small hours of Sunday morning in

Ten hours later war was declared.

Middleton, a hamlet a few miles from Rhossili – a very remote isolated area.

Having said all of this it was a huge glorious adventure – I was sent up to the local school on the Bryn – two classrooms, one for boys and one for girls,

with the loos across the yard. Believe it or not we had slates and chalk and no books – all very primitive.

But it was glorious Autumn weather. The 'cottage' was set at the head of a valley leading down across fields and cliffs to the most glorious bay. Mewslade Bay was and still is the most beautiful place, full of rocks, caves, pools and streams etc. It is washed clean every day by the tide – heaven- so every day after school we would pack a picnic and off to the beach – idyllic! By this time my six-year-old cousin Roger had joined us and along with some of the farm kids we just roamed the fields and cliffs enjoying total freedom. Looking back I am sure my Ma was totally 'shell shocked' – poor love she had led a very sheltered gentile life – trades people calling every day. Imagine she admitted she didn't know how to sign a cheque or pay bills. She was plunged into this totally alien environment with no mod cons and a 2 to 3 mile walk to the shops, coupled with the worry of not knowing how my Pa was and how the war would develop.

Anyway time passed and Christmas Tide was upon us and joy, my father had a weeks leave, arriving on Christmas Eve all fine and dandy. Carols etc., no tree but a branch decorated with homemade paper chains etc. My Ma and Pa were sleeping in a B&B (no privacy) but we had a tremendous storm that night with high winds and torrential rain. We woke up on Christmas morning to find a torrent coming through one window, flowing across the stone floor and out of the door. I can still see my ancient (or so she seemed to us) grandmother with her voluminous nightgown tucked up, a pair of willies 3 or 4 times too big, and her very long plait of white hair down her back rather than piled up like Queen Mary. She was trying hard to stem the tide! Ma and Pa joined us and we bailed out as much as we could. After a scratch breakfast – you try making toast on a tortoise stove – we trudged up the road to the church where we celebrated Christ's birth – the singing being in Welsh and glorious! We had left a chicken in the oven in the shed. The trouble was that the electricity was spasmodic at best. We should have twigged as the lights in the church went out half way through the service. We got home to a stone cold chicken in the stove and a cold oven but 'Season of Good Will' the farmer next door took pity on us and we joined them for a truly Dickensian Christmas with all the trimmings in a huge farmhouse kitchen. We ended up round the piano singing carols and Welsh songs. My father had a really lovely voice so he was accepted as an honoury Welshman. When we had first arrived we were viewed with some suspicion - these strange people from outside Wales but this Christmas broke the ice and our remaining months before we moved on to more salubrious accommodation were very happy.

P.S. I can't remember what became of the chicken!



ELLEN'S APPLE CAKE



150g butter

125g sugar

250g plain flour

2 tsp baking powder

2 tbs cream

2 egg yolks

5-8 apples depending on size

Ground cinnamon

Mix the soft butter, sugar, flour, baking powder, cream and egg yolks in a bowl or mixer.

Press the dough into a buttered/floured cake tin. A loose bottomed tin is good.

Peel and slice the apples. Pile the apple slices all over the top of the dough.

Sprinkle with cinnamon and a bit of sparkly sugar - or Demerara sugar if you like.

Put into the middle of a medium oven, 180C, 350F, Gas 4 for around 45 minutes to 50 minutes until golden.

If you have any plum or apricot jam, it tastes good with a little layer under the apples before cooking.



Arable Farming at Bishops Farm







"From Drought to Deluge!"

It seems like a different year now; when in June we were praying for rain and thankfully received 100mm that made such a difference to the harvest. Then a dry start to September to allow preparations for the new year's crops to be planted. Since then over 5inches of rain have fallen making this one of the wettest Autumns since 2012.

Planting crops has been very difficult with soils becoming waterlogged. I managed to plant winter barley in late September between rains and the Tower field has grown well; sprayed with pre-emergent chemical to control blackgrass and post-emergent spray of manganese, magnesium trace elements and an aphicide to control green aphids that carry barley yellow dwarf virus. This disease shortens the crop and reduces yield by up to 40%. Until this year we had no problem with this disease as 'Deter' seed dressing controlled aphids but this was a Neonicotinoid chemical now banned by the EU. This means we need to spray the young crops two or three times during Autumn, not easy this year with waterlogged soils. Two fields of wheat we planted in early October. Two attempts to plant the Church field with KWS Zyatt and this has now emerged and looking well.

Behind the Rectory I have planted a new variety, KWS Extase that has high resistance to the major wheat disease, Septoria. This is a fungal disease attacking the plant's leaves during the growing season. Again two attempts to plant this field – the rain just keeps coming!

With all the pre-prepared land planted, I then had two fields of wheat to plant at Dairy Farm. In early November a four day break from rain allowed ploughing, harrowing and drilling to be carried out. Thanks to help from Tom and John we managed to get both fields planted before the next downpour arrived. November is getting late for planting wheat, so you need to increase the seed rate to compensate for worsening soil conditions. At present I still have 33 acres of winter beans to plant, hopefully before Christmas if the weather allows.

Dare I mention sugar beet! I must apologise to everyone who uses Felsham/St George Road for the excessive amount of mud. All the sugar beet was lifted by last weekend. The plans were to lift the Rectory field into a Maus heap next to the road; that worked well. Then to lift 20 acres behind the Church, cart it across the road and have a Maus heap next to the road on the headland of the Tower field. All would have been well in dry weather. Two harvesters lifting beet and two large trailers carting the beet across the

road and me with a tractor and loader scraping the road after every other tractor and trailer returned to the field empty. All going reasonably well until one of the tractors ran over a piece of metal off the other trailer punctuating the rear tractor tyre – 8pm in the dark. A change of field; next to Bishops Farm where harvesting continued until midnight. Sunday morning, a 5.30am start and all the beet lifted by 11am. With the punctured tractor still on the Tower field the remainder of the beet from behind the Church had to be carted down the roads to the concrete pad at Bishops Farm putting more mud on the road. I tried to scrape up as much as possible off the road and thank you to Peter Squirell for sweeping the road with his JCB. There are now some very large mole hills on the verges of Felsham Road. Monday the lorries arrived to cart the sugar beet to the factory – another day of chaos! An empty lorry got stuck going up Felsham Road and I had to tow it up to the water tower with the plough tractor. Then a lorry reversed at Bishops Farm into our diesel tank, knocking the tap completely off the tank. Catching 1200 litres of diesel in a loader bucket is not something I would recommend but very little diesel was spilt – it could have been an environmental disaster.

Then the last load of the day was forced off the road by a car at 7pm, getting both front and back wheels stuck in the verge 15 inches deep - another pull out using the plough tractor. So this year sugar beet has been a bit of a nightmare. We await the final yield tonnage and sugar content from the factory. I am now struggling to plough the rutted fields.

Over the past three years we have been experimenting with growing cover crops. These crops, planted immediately after harvest, quickly cover the fields in lush green material that can later be ploughed in as a green manure. We have used mustard for the past two years. Last harvest we had a yield monitor fitted to the combine which showed what a good green manure mustard is. The area of the field previously planted with mustard yielded 1tonne/hectare more spring barley than the rest of the field. However sugar beet crop where mustard had been planted severely yellowed during the summer drought. This shows mustard locks up nutrients in its growth and thick stems of cellulose, which takes more than a year to break down in the soil and re-release the nutrients back into the soil. This year we planted an area of mustard, 12 acres and the remainder of the 30acre field with vetch and phacelia. At present 200 sheep are grazing the field returning the green crop nutrients back into the soil. I can't remember sheep on the farm before. The sheep are known as a 'flying flock', owned by Andy King of Whepsted and moved around from farm to farm for grazing. Please keep dogs on the lead when walking down Sheepgate Lane.

Hopefully everything will be done by Christmas! The challenges of farming are ever changing, mainly due to the weather. You cannot change it; you just work with it.
