I write this on the day of the Spring Equinox so hopefully we have left winter behind us. Certainly not a severe winter by any measure with just one brief covering of snow, not too much frost and probably best remembered for all the wind, much of it very strong. There are many signs of spring, trees are budding, the daffodils have been in flower for some time, tulips are starting to appear and magnolias are approaching full bloom. 

News from Homefield



It's a job to know where to start with this month's ramblings. Yet again the weather is the ruler. My idea two months ago of cultivating the manure I'd spread on the allotment finally arrived at the end of February. There was a little morning frost after a dry day, so the cultivator was hooked onto the tractor and off we go! Most of it went well, then the tractor driver decided to pull through the wet corner (it looked dry on top). Down we go, leaving two wheel marks 10" deep an 10ft long leading to the gateway, where the grass on the meadow helped me out. Even after forking the trenches out by hand you can still see where the tractor went in. That same tractor driver is now saying "It's for the trench celery."

In mid-March I did get the hand rotavator through the whole allotment and have managed to get a bit of tilth and drill parsnips, swedes, beetroot, carrots and onions. The broad beans planted in November look OK, about a foot tall but coming into flower. The second planting in January under plastic failed miserably, except for three plants, which grew outside the tunnel and look very well for it. I have planted the first of the early potatoes into trenches, covered with waste grass silage and then earthed over. We tried this several years ago to stop the slugs getting into the potatoes and it has worked well. However we have had exceptional conditions so far this year so we will have to see what comes or who wins – as ever Mother Nature will always win but a score draw now and again would be nice.

We had a mouse in the polytunnel about three weeks ago which caused me great stress. Two days after planting up about 50 sweet pea pods, holes started to appear in the compost and after ruling out Jenny Wren who lives in the polytunnel, the mousetraps were dug out. Four traps were set (a bit overkill really) with cheese – all so finely set

that an ant would set them off. Five days later and a pack of cheese gone, I moved onto sunflower seeds and the next morning there was a mouse in the trap. This was a good result as the next bait tray was chocolate, which is rather revered in this house and only used as a last resort. I've now got to work out how many peas are left in the pots and whether to start again.

I've had to foot trim all the sheep flock (3) again this week; the weather wet and muddy, taking its toll. Their feet become soft and the mud gets between the cleft of the hooves. This warms up and can cause infection if not removed. Lucy and Lola will both eat out of your hand so are relatively easy to catch but Treacle is still a bit wary and needs a good hurdle outlay to catch her or maybe she's heard the mouse's tale and is waiting for the chocolate treat!

Debbie and I have just got back from an early evening walk and it is lovely to see the hedges just bursting, bulbs sprouting, birds pairing and nesting; all ready for Spring. With all the troubles in the world at the moment it is heartening to see that some things carry on as normal.
