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



Bradfield St Clare Parish Council

The Parish Council met using the ZOOM technology on two occasions during recent weeks.

First meeting:

A Planning meeting was held on 21st April at 7.30pm. All the Parish Councillors and three members of the public took part in the discussion of two planning matters relating to Pitchers Green Farm.

After the meeting the Clerk to the Parish Council submitted a response to the Planning Officer.

Second meeting:

The Annual Parish Council Meeting was held on 12th May at 7pm. Councillors Soons and Mildmay-White joined Bradfield St Clare Parish Councillors in discussion.

John Kirk was re-elected as Chairman and Margaret Newlands as Vice-chairman. Alex Duchesne was co-opted on to the Council and joins the other two councillors, Malcolm Hignett and Paul Foster.

Reports from village organisations and Borough and County Councillors had been submitted earlier by email.

It was reported that it is now possible to book a slot at the household recycling centre and the collection of household garden rubbish bins (brown) should resume in early June.

The village Hall Committee has received a grant to offset loss of hiring revenue. They will not require a grant towards the cost of producing The Bradfield Grapevine this year or the hire of the hall by the Parish Council. The precept for this year is set at £2439

Approval was given for payment to be made for village grass cutting. The time allocated for the Parish Clerk was raised form 1.5 hours per week to 2 hours to help to cover the time taken to carry out the necessary volume of work for the Parish Council.

A tree on the land opposite the Village Hall will receive attention under Councillor Soons' Locality Budget. Concern was expressed over the long-term maintenance of the trees in the same area since one in particular appears to be diseased.

Our Dogs Helping the Hospice Movement



After seeing how well Captain Tom and others have raised staggering amounts for NHS charities, and reading in the EADT that Hospices were on the point of even considering closure because donations were not being received due to their shops being closed I wondered if there was a way that perhaps I could encourage people to part with a little money for the Hospice movement. Most of us have not been able to go to the pub or a restaurant recently and so may have a few guid to spare. At the same time as reading the paper I noted, that because the London Marathon was not taking place the organizers had suggested a 2.6 challenge. I then took our dog Luca for a walk and realized that our dogs are the least affected by the coronavirus, and as a result of lockdown are probably having more walks than usual. They would almost certainly be the last to suffer if food became short. I then had the idea that our dogs could encourage some fundraising by a "Crowdfunder" initiative based on our dogs and the 2.6 challenge. I therefore suggested that if we take our dogs for 2.6mile walk we could then contribute £6 or any other sum towards the Hospice movement because their nurses are as much on the frontline as NHS nurses yet Hospices receive little funds from the NHS. I emailed all of my regular Contacts asking them if they would consider making a donation and then asking them to pass on the email to all of their email Contacts so that the fund raising could be on the broadest possible basis. People have been very generous so far as no one has contributed £6 but always more! For those of you who have already contributed I would thank you and hope you can pass on the request to your friends and ask them to look at the web address above where I hope the picture of Luca will convince them that they should make a donation however small. There is no excuse if you do not have a dog because you can pretend that you have one with a virtual dog walk.

News From Homefield





It is not that many months ago that the last of in-calf heifers left Pitchers Green Farm and I was quoted as saying "never again" and wouldn't you know it, we have 4 cows on the Front Field. The cows are from Suffolk Cheeses where my cows and heifers went to start their new lives. As a result of Coronavirus, with shops and restaurants and other eateries closing, the demand for milk, cheese etc. stopped overnight leaving them with a glut of milk costing more to produce per litre than they were getting paid on the wholesale market. As a result they made the decision to dry off some cows early rather than milk them. With several cows hanging around eating grass and providing no milk, I offered to take some of the long term dry cows for the summer, which was agreed. It was arranged for 6 cows to arrive on Saturday 9th May and I had hoped all fences, gates etc. were ready. The first 3 cows arrived, were let into the field and we stood exchanging passports (cattle) at which point some people walking down the road (thank you to them whoever they were) shouted that one of the cows had jumped the hedge and ditch and was heading towards Bradfield St George, taking in several sites of interest. She was penned at Maypole Green Farm, reloaded and taken to Creeting St Mary. Apparently she is normally very guiet, so something had spooked her and she just ran and ran. A big thank you to all the people who helped with her safe capture – they are too numerous to thank individually. The second load of cows, minus one cow with a bad foot arrived and were released and behaved themselves. So we ended up with 4 cows, namely Tangerine and Barbie (ex Pitchers Green Farm) both Jerseys, Morrello and Pumpkin, both Guernseys – all hopefully 'quiet'.

I recently borrowed a set of sheep shearing clippers ready to shear our flock of three sheep. After watching for a frost free night following the clipping (I'm going soft!) the time arrived. Starting with Lucy, who I

had clipped before with scissors, was reasonably easy. Lola next with very tight wool was and a degree in 'escapology' was more difficult. She knows how to wriggle out of every hold. Finally Treacle, who with all her wool looks twice the size of the other two, was relatively quiet and once the wool was off was brought back to her normal size. I did read up on the art of shearing before the event and the book stated 22 pictorial steps for speedy and safe shearing, all of which went out of the window when Lucy started turning the pages over when I wasn't looking. As for rolling the fleece afterwards into a neat roll, forget it! The bits were put into a bag to be disposed of. However all three sheep look very smart and aren't suffering from the cooler night of late.

The allotment is I'm sure nearly ready to burst forth with a nice warm rain. The earlier seeds have germinated well but haven't got the root development to stand the dry conditions. I've got several plants to go out of the polytunnel, squashes, tomato, cucumber etc. but after last few nights of frosts they are staying put for a while. "Cast not a shout 'till May be out." The potatoes caught the frost badly despite being earthed up when the forecast came.

Debbie and I have been walking several footpaths lately including an awful lot that I've never walked before. The footpaths and general views across the fields are quite stunning in places but Debbie must be so bored with "I remember carting 1500 little bales of straw back un '86 off this field, that gateway onto the road is terrible – you are halfway across the road before you can turn with the tractor and trailer... " Around three-quarters of the surrounding fields I've baled or carted straw from and each has a memory good or bad, but I've never walked the footpaths, apparently we've got to start walking further a field (sorry about the pun
