#### **Shortcrust Pastry:**

6oz plain flour 3oz margarine (I use ½ marg. and ½ lard)

Rhubarb – 4 sticks Sprinkle of sugar

Brûlée:

300ml carton of double cream Vanilla pod 3 egg yolks plus one whole egg 2 tablespoons of caster sugar

- 1. Make pastry line a glass pie dish blind bake 10 to 15min.
- 2. Cut rhubarb into 2-3inch pieces –place on baking tray sprinkle with sugar and roast for 10min until soft but still holds its shape. Leave to cool
- 3. Heat cream in heavy based saucepan with vanilla until bubbles begin to form. Beat egg yolks and whole egg together keep stirring as you add the cream mix to combine then strain through sieve into a jug
- Place rhubarb into a flan case cover with custard mixture bake for 35-45min. (150C/130C fan oven/ gas mark2)
   It should still be a bit wobbly when you take it out.
   Leave to cool completely THEN chill for at least 30min.
- 5. When ready to serve sprinkle with light brown sugar and flash under a hot grill until sugar bubbles

PS: I found the custard\_mixture very generous\_so baked in separate ramekin dishes in a bain marie (until firm but still with a wobble!)Debbie

#### **Bradfield Weather**



'August rain: the best of summer gone, and the new fall not yet born. The odd uneven time.' - Sylvia Plath

The gloom of July from last month's report continued with significant rain during the last weekend to give a total of 46.5mm for the month compared to our average of 52.9mm.

Summer did return in the last day or so of July and carried on into August when we have had almost a week of 30C+ temperatures to make it the hottest year since1976. With the ground desperately needing rain it finally arrived on the 14<sup>th</sup> with the predicted thunderstorms reaching us in the following few days. When driving home from Bury at the end of last week, on reaching the village it was obvious that there had been some really heavy rain only to find when we reached Bush Cottage there had been very little to illustrate just how localised the rain can be. To date we have recorded 47mm against an average of 62.9mm. Our averages show that August has been the month of the most rain for the past two years!

#### **Arable Farming at Bishops Farm**



#### "Another year, Another Harvest!"

Well what a year it has been, with the wettest Autumn and Winter for years and then a dry April; drought in May and a scorching hot July. Not forgetting Covid-19 and its effects on us all. Sometimes it seems as though everything is against you when you are trying to farm, battling the elements – but as I have said before "there's always a seed time and a harvest."

With the extremes of weather we have experienced this year we were not expecting a brilliant harvest but so far yields have been variable, some fields better than expected and some poor. Not a disaster. Anyway we got started on the Tower Field, which was our earliest planted crop of winter barley, variety K.W.S Orwell. The yield was very good with large bold grain producing 58 tonnes off 14 acres, approximately 3.9 tonnes/acre, a very pleasing start.

Our next field was later planted, after the rains had started last Autumn and was still quite green, needing another week to ripen. We combined it on 29yh July. Although the headlands of the field were poor it still averaged a yield of 3.1 tonnes/acre.

Usually there is a gap between harvesting winter barley and winter wheat but not this year, with temperatures around 30C the wheat had ripened rapidly. On 30<sup>th</sup> July we started combining wheat on Church Field, at 11% moisture, good sized grain yielding 3.7 tonnes/acre. With the moisture content of the grain so low, cracking the grain was a big problem with the grain so dry, hard and brittle. The variety of the wheat was K.W.S Zyatt and this is the third year I have grown it. Every year it has performed well yielding around 4 tonnes/acre. It is prone to the disease called Septoria, however with a dry April and May we were not troubled by that this year.

The other variety I have grown this year is K.W.S Extase, a new variety that is exceptionally resilient to disease. However it did not perform very well, only yielding 3 tonnes/acre compared with the 3.7 tonnes/acre of Zyatt.

All the wheat was harvested by 4<sup>th</sup> August. I think that must be a record for the earliest harvest ever! However the spring barley is still way off being ripe, with large areas of secondary growth it will possibly be the end of August before it is fit to harvest and then to be followed by the spring beans.

This gap in harvesting has given me a chance to start Autumn cultivations. This year we are planting more cover crops. These are used to put green cover on the fields between this year's harvest and planting or ploughing for next year's crop. The cover crop captures carbon using carbon dioxide during its fast growth and the roots break up the soil. Sheep will graze most of these fields, so the land will also benefit from the sheep manure.

As I am doing the majority of this work myself, I have had a drawbar made to fit the flatlifter, which allows me to pull the discs and roll all behind one tractor – so I am doing three operations at once saving time and diesel. The fields are then planted and rolled. This has worked so well and I have planted the Tower Field with a very fast growing cover of buckwheat, linseed and mustard, which will be disced in prior to planting a crop of wheat in October.

I have planted 41 acres of fodder radish for the sheep to eat. The recent storms have arrived just on cue, seeds have germinated and the young plants are rapidly emerging.

While all this has been happening, the last of the baled straw has been leaving the farm and deliveries of Anglia Water sludge has been arriving onto the farm. This will be spread onto the stubble and then either ploughed or disced in to reduce the smell.

Hopefully Summer weather will return at the end of the month to allow us to complete harvest, plant more cover crops of vetch and fodder radish before getting land prepared for planting next year's wheat and barley. All that needs planting beginning the last week of September. Again I must say a big thank you to all my helpers, Tom and Mitch, John Kirk and David Rowe and Rodney, one of our shooters. All helped me to cart the grain back to the barns and keep the combine going. Thank you to you all!

I am pleased to hear even with Covid-19 restrictions, Revd. Sharon is planning a Harvest Service at St Clare Church on 20<sup>th</sup> September. I look forward to this to give thanks for our harvest, our health and the wonderful environment we are lucky to have and live in.
