Cockfield Benefice - October 2020

Dear Friends,

October is one of those months when the Church's calendar goes quiet. We're not celebrating any festivals and we continue in what we call 'ordinary time'. However, there are other initiatives going on, one of which I would like to highlight this month.

As you have probably been aware there has been a lot in the news lately about 'Black lives matter', quite rightly following the death of George Floyd in the USA. This was followed by the focus on slavery - and the toppling of the statue of Edward Colston in Bristol which led to the questioning of some of the other monuments we have in Britain erected in the memory of people involved in slavery in the past.

Whether that is right or wrong is not for me to make a comment on, but what I do know is that slavery continues to exist across the world today. It exists here in this country too. It's known as 'Modern Day Slavery', it is the severe exploitation of other people for personal or commercial gain. Modern slavery is all around us, but often just out of sight. People can become entrapped making our clothes, serving our food, picking our crops, working in factories, or working in houses as cooks, cleaners or nannies. From the outside, it can look like a normal job. But people are being controlled – they can face violence or threats, be forced into inescapable debt, or have had their passport taken away and are being threatened with deportation. Many have fallen into this oppressive trap simply because they were trying to escape poverty or insecurity, improve their lives and support their families. Now, they can't leave.

- 1 in 4 of them are children.
- Almost three quarters (71%) are women and girls.
- Over 10,000 were identified as potential victims by the authorities in the UK in 2019.

As you can see, it is a massive problem. In the Anglican Church we are calling the week of 12th-18th October 'Freedom Week', and then 18th October is 'Anti-slavery' day. In the benefice we will be praying and supporting those who fight against modern day slavery. I hope that you will join us in doing this. Let's work together to stamp out Modern Day Slavery! **With every blessing**

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
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
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Bradfield Weather

Having had thunderstorms earlier in August, the final 3 or 4 days of the month produced over 40mm of rain, to make a total of 115mm for the month, compared to an average of 62.9mm. This represents our highest monthly total since August 2010.

In recent months the weather seems to have been either feast or famine and in September so far we have had only one day with any recorded rain. Although the mornings in particular have had a distinct feel of autumn about them, we have seen plenty of sunshine and even a couple of days in the high 20s again. Rainfall to date is just 3mm against an average of 47mm. Ratatouille

8 tablespoons olive oil
2 spanish onions - sliced
2 green peppers - diced
2 aubergines - diced
2 courgettes cut into1/2" slices
4-6 ripe tomatoes
(peeled, seeded and chopped)

Salt and freshly ground pepper 1 tablespoon chopped parsley Pinch of marjoram or oregano Pinch of basil 1 large clove of garlic - crushed


Heat oil in a large heatproof casserole – add onions and cook until translucent. Add green peppers, aubergine and five minutes later add the courgettes and tomatoes. Simmer gently for 30minutes – it should be simmered not fried. Add salt and pepper, parsley, herbs and garlic and then cook uncovered for 10-15 minutes.

Serve hot or cold as a starter or as a vegetable accompaniment.

News From Homefield



Last month's big news was the arrival of a baby calf to one of the onloan cows. A few days before the birth I started looking closer at one of the cows, Tangerine a six year old Jersey cow whose udder appeared to be filling out. So I checked the calving due dates for the cows. The idea was to return the cows a couple of weeks before calving to get them re-settled into work mode and as her due date was 16th December, was it me overreacting? However, over the next few days she blossomed until 6.00am one morning I found her lying under an oak tree starting to calve, which was where she stayed for 3 hours getting up, lying down, straining etc. So now I started to think is the calf coming the right way, does she need help? As she really doesn't know me and vice versa I move her to a pen in another field (one step forward, three steps back – she didn't want to leave her selected spot). Once in the pen and after examination the calf was delivered, a full term Hereford cross heifer who within half an hour was up and suckling. It seems Tangerine must have held to a previous service to a certain Hereford bull names Yoda. Tangerine and calf have returned to Suffolk Cheeses along with a Guernsey cow Morello, who is due to calve at the end of September. Apparently the whole episode made me very happy and I didn't stop telling everybody about it with my usual embellishments, 3.00am on Sunday morning, wind howling, rain lashing down, minus 10C with chill factor, even carrying the calf on my own shoulders for half a mile to shelter, etc., etc., etc., but yes it was very special!

The allotment still keeps giving up its bounty (poetic stuff!); the potatoes have all been lifted and bagged into hessian sacks in the container, apart form the spiked ones – they came out clean and should store well. Carrots are doing well, nice size but some have split and appear to be starting a fresh carrot inside so double the meal. Spring onions have at last grown but just as the lettuce are going

over, so a bit of a lop-sided salad. However the tomatoes have gone mad to level it up a bit. Debbie has been busy drying and souping the tomatoes and a new venture this year, pickling gherkins. We didn't really appreciate that six plants could produce so many gherkins, but on one occasion I picked 47 of them, so glass jars became a priority. Dwarf beans are now finished with some being frozen down, but runner beans wouldn't even fill a bag to freeze. The cabbages are now hearting up and seem to be relatively free from holes. I put this down to the fact that they are netted but also to another new idea I've had and that is missing out on the weeding so the vermin can't see the cabbages and the taller weeds hold the net up to stop the pigeons sitting on the net and eating through the top "Top Tip"!

When I read back over my writings (well Debbie does check spelling and "Didn't you do punctuation at school?") there is a lot of good things to report on far outweighing the bad bits and I'm sure it's not just my selective memory. Time now for breakfast, I'm going to see if tomatoes really go with Shredded Wheat (3 of course) or will the milk curdle?
