MUSTARD CHICKEN

A few sprigs of fresh Rosemary
4 x 180g chicken fillet
4 teaspoons Colman's mustard powder
3 baby leeks or 1 large leek
4 cloves of garlic
White wine
75ml single cream
1-heaped teaspoon wholegrain mustard

Pop the chicken into a bag, pick and finely chop a few leaves from the rosemary sprigs and sprinkle them into the bag along with 1 teaspoon of mustard powder, seasoning and a little olive oil, rub over the chicken. Put the chicken into a medium hot frying pan skin side down, press down on the chicken to help it cook, it should take around 18 minutes.

Trim the leeks and halve lengthways, wash them then finely slice and add to one side of the pan, crush 4 cloves of garlic onto the chicken, flip the chicken skin side up, stir in the leeks and add a good swig of wine, simmer for a few minutes. Check the chicken is cooked then add 75ml single cream, cover with foil and simmer for a few more minutes. Remove the chicken from the pan onto a board and slice into even slices. Sstir 1 heaped teaspoon of wholegrain mustard into the sauce, spoon the sauce into a dish and put the sliced chicken on the top and serve.

Dauphinoise potatoes accompany this dish really well.

With just 3mm of rain prior to the Autumn equinox on 22nd September, the forecasters change arrived and the rest of the month was wet and windy and the month finished at 42mm compared to our average of 47mm. I don't think anyone could argue if I said that October started on the damp side, with some 40mm of rain in the first week and it has continued on and off since. Having just returned from two nights on the North Norfolk coast, our only full day there was not improved by continuous rain, heavy at times, from daybreak until nightfall and beyond. To date I have registered 80.5mm against an average for October of 57.9mm



Arable Farming at Bishops Farm



"Still battling with the elements!"

In the September issue of the Grapevine I was hoping for good weather to return to complete harvest and it did briefly happen, allowing us to harvest Spring Barley on 22^{nd} & 23^{rd} of August before yet another storm stopped us on the Rectory field, getting soaked recovering the header from the combine to journey back to the farm on the road. The 70 tonnes we did harvest was of good quality and fit for malting. Constant rain for a week meant the barley still in the field began to grow in the ear. Once this happens it cannot be used for malt as the process of germination has started with the starches in the grain being converted into sugars required to make the beer.

We finished harvesting barley on 23rd September with the last lorry load going to Ipswich dock for export as animal feed. The yield of barley was 30% down on our five year average at about 2.5 tonnes/acre but better than I expected in May.

Finally the beans were combined on 14th & 15th September; dry at 14.5% and yielded 1.6 tonnes/acre, good for the year although many had brucid beetle holes in them. The price was good and they have gone for protein animal feed.

I think this has been one of the most frustrating harvests on record, starting on 22nd July and finishing on 15th September. I was quite pleased to put the combine to bed for another year! Unusually we start planting next year's crops at the end of September, so very little time to prepare fields for the next crop. I decided not to plough the field the beans were on, so flat lifted, disced and rolled it ready to plant wheat. Also I had another 45acres of cover crop to plant for the sheep; fodder radish mixed with vetch. Again I flat lifted, disced and rolled the spring barley stubble before drilling and rolling again.

The weather changes virtually the same day as it changed last September following the same pattern as last year raining nearly every day. With the prepared fields becoming a soggy mess the end of September passed without a seed being sown. Eventually on 19th October I managed to plant 25 acres of winter barley and 20 acres of wheat before yet another 15mm of rain fell. It was worth working until 12.45 am in the morning to achieve this. Our contractor Clem Warner lifted sugar beet on 7th October, with two harvesters starting at 11am and working until 10.30pm. We lifted over 1000 tonnes. I was packing the loads up as enormous heaps 5 metres high on the concrete pad at Bishops Farm to enable the harvesting to continue. At 10.30pm we ran out of space to store the harvested crop and you guessed it

rain started yet again! 35 acres were lifted and delivered to the factory by 13th October. The yield was slightly below average at 70 tonnes/hectare (30 tonnes/acre) but sugar content of 16.5% low due to lack of sunshine and constant rain diluting the sugar in the growing roots. I still have about 5 acres of sugar beet to lift – no idea when this will happen.

200 sheep arrive at Dairy Farm this week and are munching their way through 14 acres of fodder radish behind The Maltings. That will take them about 2-3 weeks. The field will then be ploughed for next year's sugar beet crop to be planted in March.

At present I am still hoping to plant 28 acres of winter beans and a further 80 acres of winter wheat, if the land is ever dry enough to plant. If not we will have to think what different crops to plant in the Spring.

Is our climate changing, is this Global Warming or Global Drowning? At present all I can do is plough fields, if they are dry then I will plant them. If not they will be Spring planted. The winter barley and wheat I have planted needs pre-emergent herbicide to be applied against blackgrass and broadleaved weeds. Hopefully there will be a weather window in the next week when the soil is dry enough for the tractor to travel and light winds to allow spraying to be carried out.

It is all very frustrating as I battle the elements. One thing in life I have learnt is only worry about things you can change and don't worry about things you can't. The weather falls into the latter!

As the year is heading towards the end, with it's recent weather, Covid19 and Brexit/no deal on trade, let us wish for a better 2021 – Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to you all. – *Mike Morley*
