

MARCH

As in the Roman year, so in the English ecclesiastical calendar used until 1752, March was the first month and the legal year commenced on 25th March. Scotland changed the first month to January in 1599. This month was called Martius by the Romans, from the god Mars, and it received the name 'Hlyd Monath' meaning 'loud' or 'stormy month', from the Anglo Saxons. Days of note: March 1st – St David's; March 12th – St Gregory; March 17th – St Patrick; March 25th – Lady Day.

This month some of our summer visiting birds begin to arrive. The first one usually heard is the chiff-chaff. Right now birds are very busy singing in earnest to establish their territories and attract a mate. If you fancy learning a new skill during lockdown you might enjoy learning to identify our birds by their song. It is easy to find bird songs on the internet these days so if you start by perhaps learning one new birdsong a day (chaffinch and wren are good ones to start with) and the song thrush is quite easy as he repeats his song about three times (hence the old name Throstle meaning thrice song). It's a lovely thing for children to learn to do too. By the end of one week you could have learned seven birdsongs. It's a good idea to choose birds that are common in your area. Then you can put your knowledge into practice by counting how many different species you can identify whilst out for a walk.

And hark! How blithe the Throstle sings He, too, is no mean preacher; Come forth into the light of things Let Nature be your teacher.

News from Homefield



I've just started my writings earlier than usual this month due to the snow. I went out about 7am, let the chickens out, fed and watered them and stood back. They have a covered, netted area under the house which is dry and fairly cosy, however to get to this area they have to put one foot in the snow, the look on their faces said it all! In the end, after their initial 'chickening out' (sorry about that), out they all fell. I don't know if the cockerel was being gallant or wimpish but he was the last one out. I put up extra boards, sheets of tin etc. to keep the snow out but a 1/2inch gap seemed to let enough snow drift in to build a snowman. The sheep didn't seem phased by the weather, they can get in the dry and out of the wind and so long as they get fed their hay and sheep nuts they are fine. There have been a few foot problems with the wet ground, but so far have been easily rectified once I catch them. I managed to borrow a ram last year, he arrived in early December, and without putting too fine a point on it, was busy within a day. He was a breed called Texel, a meaty, muscly animal who looked like he spent most of his time working out (funny I'd never noticed him down at the gym). He didn't have a name when he arrived but has several unrepeatable ones when he left. For the first three months he respected the electric fence and was no bother. Then he decided to run straight at the fence and pop out the other side. He was no trouble to get back but it was the principle of the matter. I'd stand at the kitchen door looking out, and he would escape, as soon as he heard the kitchen door click open he'd jump back in, very amusing the first twenty

times...but just which is in charge here! He returned to his home at the end of January so hopefully in five months time we will have some lambs. I just they don't inherit some of his traits.

The allotment is under snow at the moment but somewhere there are swedes, turnips, beetroot, leeks, parsnip and sprouts, thankfully the row markers are higher than the snow so you know where to dig. It will soon be time to start planting up again. Will the rotavator spring into life at the first pull? Will the two or more pieces of seed packet fit together to identify the variety that great so well last year? I do keep a diary of seed variety that I have planted and the date sown but I haven't remembered to shut the book each time so the sun on the polytunnel has bleached the pages. It will all come out right in the end. My silage stocks are dwindling fast now, there is not much around this year and demand is high. Last year I made double the amount but so did everyone else, it was halved this year, hence the demand. What a difference a year makes (could be a good song title). Thankfully I don't sing and you maybe surprised I don't work out either.

Firstly, a warm welcome to our new editor and very best wishes to her in her new role.

The latter part of January continued to be cold and wet, with rainfall reaching 90mm, as against our average of 51.8mm. But then I never did buy into the concept of a dry January!

The main weather news in February so far has been the arrival of a significant amount of snow. (From a memory that isn't as good as it used to be, the most significant amount for several years – 2012?) Whilst building work was done, we had to move out of the house for 5 days, to enjoy the delights of Lavenham and a mediaeval – and draughty – cottage. Summary of the Minutes from Parish Council Meeting held 9th February 2021

- Speed Watch Enquiry on hold due to Covid-19 restrictions

- Anglian Water Treatment Plant The work needed regarding the overgrown brambles has been carried out. Sludge removal will be monitored for any further concerns
- Planning Pitchers Green Farm this is with the Planning Inspectorate and the Clerk will inform the committee of any updates.

Back in 2008 the village compiled a cookery book as a fund raiser....thought you might like one of the recipes:)

Florida Chicken Casserole

3lb chicken or 8 portions

1 ½ oz flour

1 tsp paprika

1tsp salt

Ground black pepper

1oz butter

Grated rind and juiced of an orange

Large can of pineapple chopped

I large orange sliced 4 fl oz chicken stock

Joint the chicken into 8 portions - remove skin. Put flour, paprika, salt and pepper in a plastic bag and shake the portions in the mixture until well coated.

Heat the butter in a pan and fry portions until golden on all sides. Sprinkle remaining flour over the portions and turn in pan until all butter is absorbed.

Place in a casserole dish, sprinkle orange rind and pour juice over. Place the chopped pineapple on top and pour over most of the juice, along with the chicken stock. Cover casserole and cook for 50-60 minutes at 180C,350F, Gas 4.

Before serving arrange the orange slices over the chicken and cook for a further five minutes without the lid. Serve with mashed potatoes and greens.
