

Church Warden's Report



November has been a busy month! On the 18th we held a concert in Bradfield St George Village Hall in aid of church funds. Entertainment was provided by the Shantyfolk and in the interval a two course supper was served to a total of 95 people. Looking back it all sounds so easy – but like swans, as we glided serenely through it, under the water our feet were paddling furiously.

Even before the great day, Lorraine Morley put in lots of hard work selling tickets, organising printing and sourcing raffle prizes, not to mention producing over 50 portions of delicious Bakewell tart. I could be seen at home, surrounded by calculations and lists, as I tried to work out just how many onions, potatoes, carrots etc you needed to feed 95 people. Local supermarket checkout staff were bemused by the contents of my trolley and fascinated by just what I might need 37 tubs of cream and 13 tubs of mascarpone for!

On the day itself, work began in earnest after breakfast, as a team of 5 helpers assembled in the kitchen to start a mammoth session of peeling, chopping, dicing and organising. Out in the hall itself another team built a simple stage and arranged – and rearranged – tables and chairs, tablecloths, napkins and cutlery.

After a very brief respite for lunch, it was back to the kitchen for the three cooks, myself, Gerard Collet and Lynn Cardale, to start

producing what felt like a mountain of chicken tarragon. By 7pm it was all ready and guests started to arrive. The adrenalin levels amongst the team were high!

And it all went wonderfully well. Phew! The Shantyfolk were a great success and everyone joined in when encouraged to, singing and punching the air. The leader of the Shantyfolk said that we were the best and most enthusiastic audience they had ever had, so a big thank you to everyone who came.

And of course a big thank you to everyone who helped, the Morleys, Will and Sue, Gerry Bullard, John Kirk, Margaret Lovick and Ian Dowling. An especial thank you to Lynn Cardale from Bradfield St George, who inspired us, organised us and cooked like a demon. Thank you too to Ukranian Svetlana, who took on the worst job of all – chopping all those onions! Last but definitely not least an enormous thank you to my fellow churchwarden Val Nunn. Val acted as runner all day and all evening and boy, did she run! Her smile and enthusiasm kept us all going. At the end of a very busy day, the Shantyfolk raised £120 for the RNLi and we raised well over £1000 for the church

And now to Christmas. In the world of our little church, it is almost upon us, as Sunday 27th November is the first Sunday in Advent. Look out for the appearance of the Christmas tree and the Advent wreath. Our Carol service is on 4th December at 4pm, led once again by the irrepressible Helen – so start practising your animal noises! Message from Australia



Since my last month's article about my harvest down under in Western Australia, a lot has gone on. Just at the end of October we had one massive storm that came over, as always seems to happen when we start harvest, in six hours we had over 50mm which is 2 inches, with that came a mix of hail and storm winds, lightening and thunder, with it being so dry here lightening it not the best thing to have as that's how bushfires start, but we were lucky.

When the storm had passed most roads were flooded and impassable, of course a lot of the roads are dirt/gravel. With that it was time to see how much damage it had done to the crops, we were lucky and had mostly got all of our oil seed rape in but we still had one paddock left (field), unfortunately the hail had stripped it all off so that's one less we don't have to harvest, the lupines had been hit hard too. Let's just hope that's the last storm we have like that.

Since being here the weather has not been as hot as they would like, normally it's around 30+ from August onwards and come December it should be 35-40+ which is very weird saying that for us English people. It's mainly 25-29 and drops to around 15 and under 10 at nights. Fingers crossed we get some heat so we can get cutting again,

in the farm's history they have never had to harvest past Christmas so let's hope that this is not the year for that record to be broken.

I'm sure some people will be wondering if I have seen any nasty spiders and snakes, well yes!! I have seen a few brown snakes which have been longer than my arm and we had a nice little surprise one evening to find a massive huntsman's spider on our outside door, the biggest spider I've ever seen in my life, the size of both my hands together. But the bigger the spiders the less dangerous they are, so we got the spider in the box and let it out far away from our place in the bush and wished it on its way.

By the start of November we were all getting itchy feet to get going again and start getting into the thick it all, unfortunately the weather was against us once again and another bad storm was on it way, so it was all hands on deck to try and get what was left of the lupines off and safely harvested. While we were harvesting was when we had some of the most challenging times. The ground was very soft in places and we had one combine go down fully, my chaser bin hit a few holes and went down, both combines blocked up with lupines and weeds so there were a few times that we had to try and unblock it and get it going again. But to top it off the storm that was forecast didn't come to anything! But out of the blue, very bad hail and heavy rain was coming for us so it was what we call stick forward and away we go. Due to a storm two weeks before the yield was down big time so combines were going 8-12kph so we were flying through it. Lightening storms all around us all night which lit up the sky amazingly, and safe to say after a 19hr day we got it all done, and of course during the early morning the storm hit and another 30mm fell.

With time now ticking to get all the rest of the harvest done we needed the weather to be on our side big time, around 15,000 acres left to cut and if things go to plan it would be six weeks of straight harvest, but with what we have seen so far I can't see this happening. We are

going to be very close to Christmas harvesting still that's for sure, let's hope we don't go over Christmas as my flight home is on the 7th Jan 2023.

I hope you enjoy reading about my experience down under as much as I love writing about it. From a young age of 21 I moved away from my family to work away from home, now 25 and being at the other side of the world, it made me realise how much families are important, and especially to me. Covid times were not kind to me and my family, sadly losing my grandad on the 20th December 2020. He was my soul and my biggest inspiration to go and do whatever I wanted to do. So, Christmas is always a tough one for all the family, going to be a bit strange Christmas with 35-40c heat and in shorts with a nice cold cider.

But I would like to say I wish you all a very Merry Christmas and happy new year. My last part of my experience down under will be in 2023

Full minutes of Parish Council Meeting will be on the Village Noticeboard -below is a brief summary.

DEFIBRILLATOR: AWA confirmed that the village cannot use the electrical supply at the Pumping Station - Parish Council are investigating alternatives.

STREET LIGHTING: We have eight lights in the parish - all owned by WSC. It is a relatively easy task to adjust to reduce timings or turn off individual lights. The Parish Council will proceed with this. NO comments had been received from parishioners at the time of the meeting held November 8 2022.

DOG POO - Signs have now been placed around the village where particular problems were occurring.

The Community Police Officer PC Lee Andrews-Pearce is due to attend the KIT Cafe on **Saturday 17th December**, if anyone would like to go along and meet with him, particularly if you have any concerns that you would like to raise directly with him.

News from Homefield



Well, here goes for my final writings of the year and I don't know where to start really! So, I'll start with the allotment. In the Spring it was all going so well, seeds germinating and the outlook was good, then summer sets in and dries it all up, we get to Autumn and its like Spring again. We have had a very good year for soft fruits, black and red currants, gooseberries, strawberries and rhubarb, not sure that's a fruit but it goes lovely in a crumble! Potatoes were another thing that did really well for most varieties that we planted. Charlotte and Saxon came out best overall for taste and flavour. We grow Marfona for jacket potatoes, these have a wonderful flavour (other varieties are available). Broad beans and Runner beans failed but the dwarf beans that were non-climbers decided to head skywards did very well. There's a title for a pantomime in there somewhere! The cucumbers, courgettes, pumpkins, butternut squashes and tomatoes did well despite no watering and three watermelons were grown in the polytunnel - with watering. We are now harvesting beetroot and turnips with the odd green and red cabbage thrown in. Back three months ago everything

looked desperate on the allotment, but writing the harvest down you realise what has been achieved and are thankful for that. Debbie tells me Christmas is in the freezer so that's good.

Now for the sheep who are up to their knees in grass again. It is now time to put a ram with the ewes for lambs next year. After this year's losses I'm in two minds whether to get a ram or not but that would leave me with expensive lawn mowers, however with the price of fuel at the moment!....?

It's coming to that time when I try to take stock of the year 'so far'. All those things I've vowed never to repeat and others that I've said 'that worked well, I'll try that again' Included are don't plant winter beans, drill swedes and parsnips earlier, pigeons eat cabbages faster than you can - find that net you folded away safely. How about giving the sheep a yoga course on how to stay calm when they are having their toenails clipped or having their coats shorn. I believe goats are into yoga so why not sheep? Just a thought. These thoughts and ideas are stored away for future use. They might not come out in the right order but it makes for a bit of fun 'mix and match'

The Elf - abet

A Lovely Christmas Recipe from Isobel

American dressing for turkey or chicken

3 slices good bread, a day old

2 sticks celery

Medium onion or 2 shallots

Lots of fresh thyme and parsley, chopped

1 clove of garlic, chopped

Salt and pepper

1 egg, beaten

1 cup of chicken stock

Oil or butter for frying

3 sausages, skinned and crumbled or equivalent amount of sausage meat

Tear the bread into pieces about 1.5cm square

Chop the onion and celery, small but not fine

Fry the sausage until golden then place in a bowl.

Gently fry the celery and onion until softened but not coloured and add to the bowl.

Stir in the bread and herbs.

Mix the egg and stock and add to the bowl. Stir through gently.

Season to taste with pepper and salt. Dot with butter.

Pile loosely into a dish. The stuffing should be about 1 ½ inches deep.

Cover with foil and bake for 30 minutes in a medium oven, then remove the foil and cook in a hot oven until the top is lightly golden and crispy.

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St Clare's Carol Service Mulled Wine

*4 Bottles of Good Ordinary Claret (or any full bodied red wine)
3 pints of water
1 orange stuck with cloves
2 oranges sliced 2 lemons sliced
6 tablespoons of honey
2 inch stick of cinnamon
2 teaspoons finely grated fresh root ginger
2 bottles of dry ginger ale*

Put all ingredients except ginger ale in a saucepan and heat to simmering point. Stir until honey is dissolved - simmer gently for 20 minutes DO NOT BOIL. Remove from heat and add ginger ale - serve immediately.



BRADFIELD WEATHER

'I'm dreaming of a white Christmas. But if the white runs out, I'll drink the red!' Unknown

Last month I finished by saying it was raining heavily as I wrote. We actually had 4mm at the time, but, as so often happens, all around us places had far more and the village missed it. The finish of October was certainly warm, with above average temperatures for the time of year, in the high teens, and on occasion 20+C by day and no lower than mid/high teens by night. A couple of windy days brought down more leaves and more rain to bring the total for the month to 38mm, against an average of 60.6mm. And still the grass grew!

The first few days of November certainly continued with above average temperatures day and night but after a couple of weeks things are changing. Very foggy mornings, high winds and the prospect of the first significant frost of the season. We have also had somewhat more rain than we have been used to in recent months. With two heavy downpours we have already, with barely half the month gone, exceeded our average of 60.4mm for November. This is the first month this has happened in 2022.
