BRADFIELD WEATHER

We spend January 1st walking through our lives room by room, drawing up a list of work

to be done, cracks to be patched. Maybe this year, to balance the list, we ought to walk through the rooms of our lives not looking for flaws but for potential. - Ellen Goodman

After a relatively dry month the end of November produced some significant rain and snow, to leave us with 34mm for the month against our average of 63.6mm

December started with a very wet first ten days, a dry patch running up to Christmas and then more rain towards the end of the month, to finish with 74mm compared to an average of 56.9mm. The notable features were a lack of sunshine, which produced a gloomy month and at the end mid-teen temperatures, resulting with the warmest New Year's Eve on record. Our annual total for 2021 was 623mm or 24.5 inches slightly above our 28year average of 613mm.

From that warm start to the year, I think it is fair to say the early days of January 2022 have been cold with low daytime temperatures and frosts by night. There has only been one day with any significant rain and to date we have just 14mm, with our monthly average at 51.3mm. We have just returned from a week in the Kent Downs and have enjoyed some lovely weather with cold, sometimes frosty nights and sunny days with cloudless skies and on those days with little or no breeze, warm enough to sit looking at the ever

changing scene out to sea. I understand the village weather has been similar but lacking a sea view! **Keith Payne 23 January 2022**

News from Homefield

I sit here mid-afternoon ready to write my piece for the Grapevine. We had a sharp frost this morning, which soon cleared but now it's as though somebody has put a fog machine on full bore. The sheep were visible ten minutes ago, but have now disappeared, hopefully not literally! I'm sure if I tapped the feed bin they would appear.

The allotment is very wet at the moment and apart from spreading compost on the surface ready for rotovating in later on, nothing has really been happening. We still have beetroot, parsnips, leeks and turnips which are holding up quite well in the ground. The carrots which were looking and tasting really good have now got the fly so you have to pick and choose the good bits. In the polytunnel I have a few sweet peas ready for repotting and have put some broad beans in pots for an early start.

We borrowed a ram again this year and hopefully around 1st April we should have a few lambs. You would have thought after my last writings concerning escaping sheep I would learn to think ahead. Here I quote from my November writings (never thought I'd be able to "quote" myself) "Finding a ram without a Houdini gene could be a priority". The ram in question was named Houdini, but hopefully it's only a name. I might try a numbered one next time. With all the wet, muddy weather I have had a few foot problems with the sheep. This week it was Lola who was very lame on her front foot. I penned her to trim her foot. I wasn't really sure about lifting her up, as she is hopefully in lamb and I might disturb something. So I went for her foot, lifted it up, trimmed and cleaned it whilst she just stood there. Does this make me a 'sheep whisperer' or will I pay for it next time. Another thing that struck me was how well all the other sheep were walking whilst watching me carefully trimming Lola's feet - worried about being next?

Just looked back to my first writings in April 2014 and apparently the bedding in the cow yards was getting very high, enough for Sheila the Shorthorn to push on the guttering to make it squeak. Martha was due to calve next and turnout to grass was imminent. Harrowing and aerating the grass were the next outdoor jobs. There was also a disclaimer at the end stating that all the female names in the above piece were for identification purposes only and bear no resemblance to any of the local ladies.

GATEHOUSE FOOD BANK

Parish Council News

At the Parish Council meeting in November 2021, the amount we ask West Suffolk Council to provide the Parish Council for annually was agreed. It is known as the Precept, and is the Parish Council's budget for the year.

The Precept for 2021-2022 was £2660. We have increased it in 2022-2023 to £3184. £440 of that increase is to cover an increase in hours for our Parish Clerk. The hours will increase from 3 hours per week to 3.5 hours per week.

The increase in the Precept equates to an increase of £6.31 per year for a Band D property in the village (will increase or decrease depending on the Council Tax Band of your property). £6.31 is approximately 12p per week for a Band D property

Litter Pick - Saturday 5th March

The Parish Council look forward to seeing as many volunteers as possible to help with the organised litter pick on Saturday 5th March, starting at 10am outside of the Village Hall. All litter picking equipment and black bags will be provided but please bring along your own gloves. These organised litter picking events have been very successful in the past and we hope that this years' one brings out as many volunteers as possible to help keep our village looking at its best.
