"...I've got a brand new Combine Harvester ..." (but Mike doesn't!!!)

When we had the good fortune to lease Bishops Farm Bungalow we hoped that village life would give the opportunity to feel part of a friendly and strong community, and a sense of connection with the beautiful countryside and landscape. These hopes have been realised, in bucket loads, so thank you for your very warm welcome.

What I hadn't envisaged was excitement, thrills, fear and the realisation of a childhood dream (too unrealistic to be an ambition).

My school classroom overlooked farmland and I have to admit that I spent most of my maths lessons gazing out of the window watching farmers at their work (yes I failed GCSE maths). The combine harvester was my favourite – the slow, precise passage through the fields, the miracle of the process from tall cereal crop to gold grain. I so wanted to do that. Having watched Mike, our landlord extraordinaire, harvesting over our garden hedge. I told him how envious I was. His immediate response was "Well come and have a go". Within hours I was in the fields and sitting in the driving seat of a tractor and trailer! Excitement and fear vied for my immediate attention, but with Mike's calm, reassuring instructions excitement won the day. It was brilliant. After a few turns around the field Dan, Mike's incredibly knowledgeable assistant took me to the grain store to unload the trailer – he taught me so much about the process of barley from sowing to Adnams beer.

Back at the field Mike was waiting in the combine harvester – he expected me to drive it! With shaking legs I climbed aboard and – I actually did it! Apart from panic as we neared the end of a row and when the rabbits ran out (they all escaped – some just bolted but one or two lay low in the straw in the next row and reminded me of a child who covers his eyes so you can't see him!). It was brilliant, amazing and wonderful. I had a permanent grin on my face for days afterwards and still smile when I think of it.

Thank you so much Mike and Dan for an unforgettable experience – and I apologise for my 'wavy' lines – but I might get better with practice! Also thank you everyone, including the rare bread basset who just made me smile, the hero medal winner and the spaniel who nearly out bounced Bruno, for the very warm welcome.

Notes from the Parish Council

At the meeting of the Parish Council on 9th August, the chairman welcomed all councillors and four members of the public.

- The minutes of the previous meetings were approved and signed as a true record
- Pot holes: The number and state of so many pot holes on our roads was
 discussed with particular attention being given to the worrying collapse of
 the road opposite the Mouse House. The clerk will once more contact
 Guy Smith with a list of the pot holes and their dimensions and include
 data concerning the series of pot hole close to Four Seasons on Bury
 Road
- Speed limit on Bury Road: Once again the new criteria from SCC Highways Department was considered. The clerk will contact SCC on our behalf
- The Operational Hub for waste disposal at Hollow Road has been approved by SCC
- Devolution: Suffolk has agreed to go to the next stage of consultation with the public. Some Councils in Norfolk have voted not to support devolution but both Suffolk and Norfolk County Councils have voted to support the proposal despite the main sticking point being the position of an elected Mayor
 - Cllr Clements' report detailed the results of a Suffolk wide resident poll on devolution, which showed that 3 out of 5 people support the proposal. The poll surveyed 1820 people by telephone across the county between 20th and 30th May 2016. The poll was conducted by MORI on behalf of SCC. More information can be obtained from members of the council
- Greener Business Grants: The Borough Council will match fund businesses up to £1000 towards the cost of electric vehicles or charging points
- Broadband: Broadband speed and reliability was discussed with several members of the public making informed contributions. A survey of all broadband users in the village will be conducted and the results conveyed to Community Broadband, BT OpenReach and Jo Churchill MP to attempt to improve speed and connectivity throughout the village. This survey is included in this issue of The Bradfield Grapevine please take a few minutes to complete your copy
- Our local farmers were thanked for their endeavours to keep our village roads safer by cutting hedges and verges. It was noted that many of the verges have been eroded, particularly those at a lower level, further endangering the lives of walkers as they have nowhere to move off the road when avoiding oncoming traffic
- The Parish Council thanked Peter Sturgeon for his offer to become Webmaster for the new Parish Council website. He will receive no payment for this role but it was agreed to cover the £60 cost for the required training.

Arable Farming at Bishops Farm

After a break from writing in July, thanks to Tom, I am back once more again to report on farm life and the 2016 harvest. With a particularly wet May and June, we took 18 days holiday to Canada and the Rock Mountains. A superb trip, good weather, wonderful scenery and visiting Lorraine's and my relatives en route.

Well harvest always starts the last week of July whatever the weather has done during the year. I was horrified as we flew back into Norwich airport to see combines below trundling across fields on 18th July. The rush began that very evening, sorting out problems that had occurred while we had been away, including Dan being taken ill.

Next morning it was all go to prepare the combine for harvest, get tractors ready and that evening to start harvesting the winter barley. All a bit of a shock after a relaxing time in Canada!

Anyway, Dan recovered and came back to work. Also Jacob Walton had asked if he could help with harvest this year during his school holidays. After tuition in tractor driving, he started driving beside the combine to unload the grain on the move. Well done, Jacob!

The winter barley crop had been very thick all year and promised to be an excellent crop. However all the rain in May and June and lack of sunshine reduced the grain fill resulting in thin grain. Although the yield seemed good it was bulky having little weight. A big heap in the barn, but it proved difficult to get 29 tonne on the Openfield lorry, with the driver shunting back and forth to level the heaped load. We have to sell winter barley as soon as it is harvested by 23rd July.

As usual there is a two to three week break in harvesting before we start spring barley and wheat. During this time we take the opportunity to cultivate the winter barley stubbles to produce stale seedbeds. This involves flat lifting and compacting soil to a depth of 15in, then power harrowing the surface to produce a fine seedbed to encourage volunteer cereals and blackgrass to grow. Then roll the field to retain moisture. This has proved very successful with 10mm of rain over 31st July and 1st August. The Church Field is now green and will shortly be sprayed with Roundup to kill off all the weeds before ploughing again for next year's wheat crop.

Harvesting resumed on 8th August on spring barley for malting (beer). Again yield was down compared to last year due to the wet weather but at least the quality seems good and prices have increased to compensate for lower yields. The weather remained dry and sunny and grain moistures

still low at 12%-13% well below the 14% minimum required by the grain trade. All the spring barley finished on 12th August.

In to the wheat crop, again low moisture, dry and sunny so excellent harvesting conditions. As wheat is protected by husk, the moisture does not rise quickly in the evening, so this means harvesting can continue well into the night. Hence you probably heard combines and tractors roaring around well after midnight! We usually continue until the grain moisture rises to 14% before we stop harvesting – 12.45am being the latest we went to this year. All the wheat was finished on 17th August.

Although yields have been lower this year it has been one of the least challenging harvests due to the best weather I can remember for a long time. All the straw bailed and most of it cleared we now start more stubble cultivations, also applying potash and phosphate fertilizer and ploughing and rolling to prepare for planting next year's crop. The cycle of life begins again on the farm.

Weather controls everything on the farm, too much rain and not enough sunshine has reduced our yields this year but we have still had useful crops. We must think of the not so fortunate farmers in parts of the world affected by droughts and floods where total crop loss has occurred with resulting suffering of the people.

Our harvest is not over yet; we have spring beans to combine in late September and the sugar beet to harvest at the end of October. We look forward to Harvest Festival, scarecrows in the fields and an exhibition of harvest in days gone bye and of course, our Harvest Supper!
