Gardening jobs for July (feel exhausted just reading them!)

Plant autumn bulbs in pots and borders

Feed, water and deadhead summer bedding regularly

Cut back early summer perennials, for example hardy geraniums and delphiniums you will be rewarded with a second show

Take softwood cutting from shrubs

Feed and deadhead roses to keep them flowering

Watch out for pests such as lily beetles, snails, aphids and vine weevils

Sow biennials eg foxgloves, honesty, forget-me-knots and wallflowers for planting next year

Oh! and pick courgettes regularly - stuffed marrow for tea!!

Chunky Courgette Soup

3 medium size potatoes
2 leeks
1 pint vegetable stock
2 celery sticks - chopped finely
4 medium sized courgettes - grated
2oz cheddar cheese - grated
Salt and Pepper
Wash leeks and potatoes and chop and cook well in the stock Liquidise.
Cut courgettes in half lengthwise and then into chunks. Simmer in the puree until cooked but still al dente. Stir in cheese - heat until melted
Season to taste and eat with lovely crusty bread.



News from Homefield

Starting with the allotment this time, mainly because at time of writing it is pouring with rain and you can almost see the plants growing. I have been watering the tomatoes and cucumbers, as they haven't been planted very long so their roots are not yet deep enough to tap into the moist soil lower down. We have started harvesting new potatoes (Swift) which are a good size and taste good. However, these were planted into old grass silage for warmth and slug prevention. About 1:4 potatoes have a slug hole, not sure what percentage confirms the 'old wives tale'. Rhubarb continues well and we've had several pickings of strawberries. The raspberries are starting to ripen and we've had some redcurrants (fiddly things to pick but very worth it). Runner and dwarf beans have really moved in the last week despite no rain. I know I'm being picky but a little rain to set the flowers would be nice. Beetroot and carrots are very hit and miss with their germination so I will have to do a bit of re-seeding. I've lifted the winter sown garlic and onions and they are hopeless. I'm not sure whether they rotted in the wet or the ones that survived were too compacted. Let's hope the Spring sown crops which look much better will compensate. Finally I would like to say how well the weeds look this year,

marvellous how they survive 'carefree' for generations. For me this year it's mainly bindweed wrapping everything up.

We had one sheep named 'Seven' with flystrike this year. The fly lays its eggs in the warm moist wool of the sheep, these hatch into maggots which start eating into the flesh. It is fairly easy to remedy and I decided to shear all the wool off her as I usually do once a year. After a while I realised I'm not as young as my head thinks I am, she was totally fed up and the battery and spare battery had run out. I had to give in. I had to leave her with a 'Lion's mane' but she was so pleased to be free of maggots and me she wasn't bothered. I phoned a professional who came out and sheared the 5 1/2 sheep in about half an hour with no fuss at all. I heard that all six sheep thanked him personally in writing.

The chickens have a plastic dustbin containing their food next to their hut. One morning the lid had a cup size hole in it. Opening it up there was no clue as to what had caused it, giant hailstone? Meteor? Space debris?. I found a new lid and moved on. Next morning the lid was intact, so I lifted it up to get the food and a squirrel popped its head out of the side of the dustbin. It had gnawed a hole in the side of the bin and was treating itself to breakfast. I'm not sure who was more surprised, but the bin is now a metal dustbin and the squirrel is looking for a dentist!

I know I appear a little obsessed by rainfall and I'd better consider the temperatures too! The heat has arrived as have, thankfully, the balmy evenings – the summer solstice evening was a lovely one and (on a very rare evening with no youth at home) we sat outside for most of it (and ignored the thunderflies which descended into our drinks – all good extra protein!).
