July

If April, May and June are a treat for the eyes, so July is delight for the sense of smell. As I write this we have had some welcome rain after much hot, dry weather and the scent of damp barley on ear is one of my favourite perfumes ... you can keep your Channel No 5! Many of our wildflowers that appear in July are also beautifully perfumed.

Honeysuckle should now be in full bloom amongst our hedgerows, and you will often smell it before you see it, especially if you walk out in the early evening. A fact I discovered about honeysuckle is that it is collected by the Hazel Dormouse to line its nest. What clever little creatures to make a nest with such sweet-smelling sheets! Also blooming right now are Wild Roses. They are also known as Dog Roses as they appear around the start of Dog Days. They offer a delicate fragrance but sadly do not last very long so enjoy them while you can. By the time you read this the Meadowsweet should be blooming on the roadside verges. There are normally several patches of Meadowsweet along the verges and ditches at Pitchers Green. Well worth a sniff if you happen to be passing.

Dog Days begin on 3rd July and last through to 11th August. The ancient Romans named these as the hottest and most humid days of summer. The Dog Star, Sirius, rises and sets with the sun. It is part of the constellation Canis Major (*large dog*). The ancients felt that the combination of the sun during the day and the star at night was responsible for the extreme heat during midsummer.

In celebration of Dog Days here is a piece written by the novelist **John Galsworthy** about man's, and woman's, best friend:

"If I were condemned to spend 24 hours alone with a single creature, I would choose to spend them with my dog. There is a quiet comfort in the companionship of a dog with its ever-ready touching humility, which human companionship, save of the nearest, does not bring".

My finishing words last month, written on 21st may were "gale force winds promised but no real warmth". The winds duly arrived and indeed some real warmth in the last couple of days in May – summer has arrived! Total rainfall for the month was 62.5mm, above our May average of 51.8mm.

June started with three days of unbroken sunshine and then three days of sunshine and showers. This was followed by many days of real warmth reaching the high teens centigrade by mid-month but then a real change again the following day with temperatures down to the mid-teens centigrade with rain some of it very heavy.

Today, as I write, it is the summer solstice but the weather anything but the height of summer, cold and wet. I said earlier summer had arrived – let's hope that it has not now departed and there are better days to return. Rainfall to date is 40mm against our June average of 56.1mm.

News from Homefield

It all started May 1st; it was a very frosty morning at about 4.30am. For some unknown reason I woke up and decided to go for a stroll round the field. First thing I saw was Lucy (the sheep, just to clarify!) with one tiny lamb which had just been born. Lucy was coated in frost and the lamb was steaming and shivering at the same time, already trying to stand up and look for Mum's teat. After taking in the scene, and in true British style, I decided to have a cup of tea, back to the bungalow, tea made, walk back with said tea, to find a second lamb born.

Quite a magical moment on a cold frosty morning, the sight of two new lives and a very proud Mum. I've been privileged to witness this so many times, but it is still special.

Ten days later it was Treacle's turn, slightly different approach, but similar result. The previous afternoon she had been wandering around the paddock restlessly, pawing at the ground trying to make a "nest". Given her 'attitude' problem at times I decided to put her into a hurdle pen with the tin shelter so if help was needed I wouldn't have to chase her around the field. At six the next morning two lambs were born, no help needed, Mum and lambs all fit and well.

On 24th May Lola lambed, again twins and again no help needed. All in all, a very good result, three ewes produced six lambs, three ram lambs and three ewe lambs, trebled our flock in three weeks, is three the magic number!!

Mid-May also saw the hatch of seven chicks to a broody hen who sat for 21 days solid. I was lifting her off every three or four days to eat, drink etc and within two minutes she would be back on the nest, thankfully she was very friendly and didn't object too much. All that changed when the chicks hatched – she's in charge now and don't you forget it!

It's funny watching the young animals as they grow, their different reactions to Mum's calls and their reaction. At first doing everything they should to keep safe, running to Mum when the magpie is about, don't go near the cats, don't touch the electric fence, don't eat that etc. Then it's alright to stand up to the cockerel (Dad) in the next pen, escape is an option, jumping on Mum's back is allowed, seeing how

many of the 'Gang of Six' can get on the roof of the field shelter at the same time – brilliant.

There is a word for putting human emotions or feelings onto animals, at the moment I can't remember it and probably couldn't spell it anyway! (hopefully an editor will help (**Editors**: Anthropomorphic – good quiz knowledge!).

Next, we moved onto shearing the sheep, first borrow a pair of electric clippers, pick one of the hottest days, select a sheet and proceed. Lucy was first in line, complete with photo of how she would like to look on completion. Everything went perfectly until the clippers broke down, thankfully only two more swipes with the hand shears needed to remove the Mohican style along her back.

Clippers fixed, start on Treacle ...again clippers failed so it was a scissor and shear clip. I couldn't leave Lola without a trim, so she too was done with scissors and hand shears. Not sure they were overly impressed with their new hairdo's! Thankfully, the clippers are now fully repaired, and all the sheep have had a second tidy up. (Thank you to all family and friends who reminded me about the Specsavers advert, most amusing).

The silage/haylage crop is now all baled, wrapped and stacked. Without any cows this year there were more areas cropped and a much better yield than last year. Weather conditions were perfect, plenty of sunshine and a nice drying breeze, as I write this six days later we are due an inch of rain and thunderstorms.

The allotment needs a gentle soaking again, I find it hard to adjust to the extremes of the weather. We have a week of very hot temperatures and then we will have rain, from cracks in the soil to a mud bath. The flowers in the garden look beautiful in the sun and the strawberries taste even better when warm and along comes a heavy rain and ruins it. Thank goodness we can't control the weather -what else would I moan about!

Actually, I would ask the two crows (I only suspect it's them so far) who are taking the broad bean pods off the plant, opening them up and eating the young, succulent, tasty beans inside to STOP!! NOW! Those are for our supper not yours! -GLYN
