JUNE

In the old Latin calendar June was the fourth month. The Anglo Saxons called it 'the dry month' also 'midsummer month'.

<u>Saint's Days etc</u>: June, 11th – Saint Barnabas; June 24th – Midsummer Day (Nativity of St John the Baptist); June 29th – Saint Peter.

<u>June Mottos</u>: 'A dripping June keeps all in tune'. 'June damp and warm, does the farmer no harm'

'Barnaby bright. All day and no night'

This is the time of year when butterflies appear, and who can fail to be moved at the sight of these beautiful creatures? A few weeks ago I saw my first Brimstone butterfly with his gorgeous large bright yellow wings closely followed by the smaller and delicately patterned Speckled Wood. By the time you read this we will hopefully be enjoying warmer weather and see the arrival of the Red Admiral, Tortoiseshell, Peacock and Painted Lady. Many of these rely on nettles for food and to lay eggs. So if you can bear to leave a patch in your garden you will be doing nature a great favour. Somebody bought me a lovely Emma Bridgewater mug decorated with nettles and butterflies. It has this message printed on it:

"Nettles may be WEEDS to some but are A LIFELINE to others". Easy with the mower, leave some patches of nettles for the bugs and butterflies. (I don't really advise nettle soup unless you are very hungry."

I've always found it enjoyable to discover some unusual wild flower, bird or bug that I don't recognise. I will try to remember what it looks like and identify it when I get home. I was therefore saddened to read recently that 30% of 8-11 year olds cannot identify a magpie, but most can spot a Dalek! It reminded me of several years ago when a friend from town visited. She thought I'd gone all "Victorian Lady" when she saw two peacocks on my lawn. I told her not to expect any cucumber sandwiches and tea in china cups

spiring quotations with us. I thought they were too good not to pass on: And those peacocks are pheasants!

Finally at our circle dance group recently our tutor shared these two in

What is growing in Bradfield St Clare?

As we gradually say goodbye to winter for this year and Spring has burst into life since the very welcome rains over the last fortnight, I thought I would take the reins from Mike with regard to keeping you all abreast of activities at Bishops Farm. Autumn 2020 planting was greatly compromised due to the wet weather and so we faced a long winter of bare fields before the weather finally broke in Early April for wheels to turn again and crops to be sown. At the Pitchers Green end of the farm for the first time in a very long time we have 14 acres of Westerwold grass planted this spring. This very quick growing grass will be cut and baled for silage a mere 8-10 weeks after it was planted. Drilled with the old accord tine seeder Mike took the time to cross drill (plant twice in two directions) in order to increase the plant population and create an evenly established thick sward for cutting early summer. Short term grass leys offer a fantastic soil structuring break in an otherwise predominantly arable rotation.

Through the heart of the farm, heading North Westerly up Sheepgate Lane you will pass by Spring barley on your left-hand side facing towards The Church, followed further along the lane by Sugar Beet as you look over to Bromley Wood. The beet are just emerging and growing by the day you can just about make them out visible along their rows now. With the rain also comes plenty of bindweed, thistles and Knotgrass which we will control in due course to allow the crop to establish free from competition. Later in the summer we will mechanically hoe this crop between the rows in order to complete any later weed control.

On the right-hand side of the lane you'll see our newly planted hedge is greening up nicely now we've had some rain and some warmth and over the hedge you will see a field of peas. Biggest job at the moment is keeping the pigeons off this crop! They love a sweet freshly emerged pea plant and if not moved on daily they can cause a lot of crop damage. As a leguminous crop, the peas have an inherent ability to fix their own Nitrogen from the air into the soil, not only feeding themselves, but

leaving a bank of residual Nitrogen for the following cereal crop thus reducing our bought in fertiliser requirement for next season. At the top of Sheepgate lane you'll pass by a long field on the right of spring sown oats, another crop not grown on the farm for a while the oats add yet more crop diversity to our rotation and farmed environment.

Either side of the Church this year we have Spring beans to the right, and another field of Sugar beet to the left of church lane. The beans will be harvested late summer and the beet will stay in the ground until late Autumn when the factory opens for processing.

You may also notice areas of fields currently left cultivated which will in time be planted with wild bird seed mixes and pollen and nectar species as part of our countryside stewardship scheme we launched this year. Pollinating insects and birds are vital to the diversity of species on the farm and these plots will encourage an abundance of life that will help support the vital act of pollination later this summer where our crops will set seed for us to harvest in Summer and early fall.

The sun is now finally poking out today as I look out of my office window, I can almost see the beet growing in the sunshine! Lovely to see the house martins darting up and down to the eves of the house also, what a pretty part of Suffolk we all live!

I finished last month on days of frosty mornings, sunny but cold days and so it continued to the end of April. It proved to be a month of contrasts as the frostiest month ever, sunniest but coldest for many years and with no further rain in the latter part with just 3mm, the driest in the village since 1996. Our average for April is 38.6mm.

The badly needed rain duly arrived at the beginning of May with the early Bank Holiday having very high winds to go with it — one family's scheduled outdoor pub lunch duly ruined! The winds continued for a couple of days and since then we have lost the frosty nights and had very unsettled weather with sunshine and showers, some heavy with hail, and the odd thunderstorm. It has been good growing weather with the trees quickly acquiring their leaves, cow parsley on verges springing up and the grass needing frequent cutting. Some parts of the country have had well beyond their average rainfall but we have so far had 45mm against our average of 51.8mm. Now a day or two of gale force winds promised, but still no real warmth.
