Road repairs and associated work along C697 Bury Road, Bradfield St Clare and C697 Bradfield Road, Cockfield.

The works are programmed to take place between **9 and 15 May 2023.** The roads will be closed each day to ensure that we can carry out our works safely.

For the duration of the road closure, traffic will be diverted via Great Green, Cockfield, Chapel Road, Cockfield, Howe Lane, Cockfield, A1141, A134, Water Lane, Little Whelnetham and vice versa.

As we plan roadworks in advance, we schedule extra days to allow for bad weather or other delays beyond our control. If we need to make major changes to our work dates, we will update the information signs on site.

Letter from the Rectory

Dear Friends,

May is beckoning, and so hopefully is the better weather. I have just spent a few days off after the Holy Week and Easter services clearing and cleaning the house and garden. Sweeping away cobwebs in the garage is not my most favourite task, but it needed to be done!

Thinking about this has made me remember the parable of the lost coin. Jesus was a master storyteller, and the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) are filled with his stories. They entertained, connected with and taught whoever heard them, and they continue to do so today.

Jesus used them to reach his listeners in a powerful way. The parable of the lost coin tells a basic and wonderful truth about God's love. It is meant to encourage us in our faith - and I find that it always encourages me.

The story is found in Luke chapter 15, verses 8-10. In it, a woman who has ten silver coins, then loses one. She lights a lamp, sweeps the house from top to bottom and searches carefully until she finds it. And when she finds it, she calls her friends and neighbours together and says, 'Rejoice with me; I have found my lost coin'.

In this parable, the woman's coins are very valuable to her, just as we are valuable to God. It reminds us that every one of us is precious to God, and will never give up on us, no matter what!

Sometimes we can be a bit like that lost coin, we may feel far away from God and a bit lost. But God is always there for us to turn to. We are not forced to turn to God, but the invitation to do so is always there. If you want to know more about God's invitation, don't hesitate to get in touch!

BRADFIELD WEATHER

As I write this, it's the most glorious day outside with not a cloud in the sky and Spring is well and truly here, so you're just going to have to forgive me for the moaning and praying for rain I did at the end of February – somebody was listening somewhere and certainly delivered!

March had more than double its 30 yr average of 35.64mm of rain but if we consider February and March together the rainfall in the two months combined this year was about 90mm and the average is just under 80mm – so we just got two months of rainfall in one!

For the past 4 years we've had less than 20mm of rain in April. In the first 2.5 weeks we've had around 34 mm which has come in various downpours – anyone else got caught in that hail storm last week as they were trying to catch a horse to put its rug on?!



We haven't planted the tulip meadow this year (hope to next year!) but I'm very pleased the tulips I left in pots and fed over last summer are making a decent show.

NEWS FROM HOMEFIELD

The sheep have now been brought home to the 'higher pastures' for the summer. This will give the front field time to recover for the silage crop later on, not that six sheep on six acres is particularly intensive farming. Armed with a bucket and a few sheep rolls I led them up to Homefield. After one or two diversions for the "other man's grass is always greener" we all arrived safely. I had split the paddock into two, to give them a fresh bite when needed, and to shut them to one side to get tractors in and out. For the first few days they had the run of both paddocks but I then noticed that they were spending all their time in the paddock nearest the bungalow, lining up grazing and staring into the kitchen. So, I have shut them in the far paddock which didn't go down too well, they just lined up and stared at the bungalow. Whether it's where their food comes from, or they enjoy human company or are just 'sheep' I'm sure they will settle down soon. I just hope from that distance they can't lip read!

It is so nice that my seven hens can now be let out and roam relatively freely. The first time was amusing for me but obviously scary for them. They ran out of their netted run with great abandonment, flying every where. Then it dawned on them what had happened and they scuttled back to their comfort zone. No eggs were laid that day - we had been getting three or four a day in the previous weeks. Next day I dismantled the netted run and lo and behold they were more interested in going

back to their old boundaries. The egg numbers have returned and they have settled in their wider world again. Are they really sheep dressed in feathers?

The allotment is all a bit stop start at the moment after all the rain. We now have dry sunny days but a very cold wind. The first potatoes are poking through but with the night frosts I'm earthing them up as they pop out. Parsnips, beetroot, carrots and lettuce have been drilled outside. In the tunnel we have runner beans, courgettes, squashes, pumpkins, cucumbers and sweetcorn at various stages of growth. There is also a good crop of sweetpeas which the mice haven't found yet.

The good thing about a stop/start Spring is the garden furniture, which had so lovingly been stored/stacked away has been brought out and either painted or oiled in preparation for the lazy balmy days of summer. Different from other years when it's first retrieve furniture from the back of the log shed, quick paint job then hoping they will be dry for that special occasion the next day! Next problem is to remember the biscuit, butter, cheese problem for said occasion. Do you need one more biscuit to finish the cheese and butter left on your plate or do you double the quantity on the last remaining biscuit on your plate? Thankfully glasses of wine are not included in this conundrum - that would just confuse everybody.


