Halloween

This is largely agreed to have originated from the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, held around 1 November, the date that marked the transition from autumn to winter. It was this time of year where people believed the boundary between the worlds of living and dead became blurred, and was when the souls of the dead were said to revisit their homes. In the era of Christianity, this tradition became absorbed into the celebration of All Saints Day, held on 1 November, dedicated to honouring all saints and martyrs. The 2 November became All Souls' Day, a day to honour the dead, and here many of the Celtic traditions, such as bonfires, parades and dressing up in costume, blurred with Christian celebrations, to form festivities accepted, and even encouraged, by church authorities.All Saints Day later became known as All-Hallows and from this the night before came to be referred to as All-Hallows Eve. From this term derived the name 'Halloween', the name for the beginnings of the festival that was celebrated across Europe in the early Middle Ages, and stuck even as the religious celebrations fell out of favour in later centuries.(English Heritage)

Remember clocks fall back on Sunday 29 October.

She was so pleased finally to be able to use the church's first aid kit!

And a big thank you to my biking buddy, Ian Dowling, of Cockfield, who not only cycled for our church again, but kept me going through the heat, made me laugh and bullied me up Rattlesden Hill. For those of you who think that Suffolk is flat – it isn't! Together we raised over \pounds 1000 for the first time – final figure next month.

Parish Council News

Some Parishioners have been dealing with the ongoing foul odour problem with the Anglian Water Treatment Plant (near the Village Hall). Anglian Water have come out to the Treatment Plant and identified that the aerobic bacterial process had malfunctioned due to problems with the aeration pump, and work was carried out in relation to this problem.

Properties in the village that are situated downwind of the Water Treatment Plant are susceptible to foul odours when the bacterial process breaks down and when this occurs we would ask those parishioners to contact Anglian Water on the emergency number they provide on the fencing at the Treatment Plant (0345 714 51450) and file a formal complaint. This will enable an accurate record to build up of any ongoing problems but also alert Anglian Water to the problem in order that they can visit the site quickly and carry out any necessary works.

If residents visited the Anglian Water website it gives information about items that need to be placed in the bin as opposed to down the sink or toilet. Such items include babywipes, make up wipes, food peelings, cotton buds, sanitary products, wrappers and razor blades.

After researching online for harmless remedies to deter them, the most fun one appears to be to lay conkers on your window sills and in the corners of your rooms - they need to be belly button up (if you know what we mean!). Apparently they exude a scented oil that spiders can't stand so they pack their bags and move out. Peppermint or Lemon oil is the other advice. Definitely going to give the conkers a trial - double bonus - fun collecting them and hopefully a spider free home!

Pumpkin Soup

2 tbsp olive oil

2 onions, finely chopped

1kg pumpkin or squash peeled, deseeded and chopped into chunks

700ml vegetable stock or chicken stock

150ml double cream

Method

STEP 1

Heat 2 tbsp olive oil in a large saucepan, then gently cook 2 finely chopped onions for 5 mins, until soft but not coloured.

STEP 2

Add 1kg pumpkin or squash, cut into chunks, to the pan, then carry on cooking for 8-10 mins, stirring occasionally until it starts to soften and turn golden.

STEP 3

Pour 700ml vegetable or chicken stock into the pan and season with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, then simmer for 10 mins until the squash is very soft.

STEP 4

Pour 150ml double cream into the pan, bring back to the boil, then purée with a hand blender. For an extra-velvety consistency you can pour the soup through a fine sieve. *The soup can now be frozen for up to 2 months.*

News from Bishops Farm -Autumn 2023



Another year is rapidly disappearing as we see the evenings draw in and the temperature start to cool off. The combinable harvest has been complete for over a month now with just the Sugar Beet left to harvest for this year. The wheat, winter barley and spring oats all performed very well in terms of both grain and straw yield; and the spring barley was average but was to be expected by planting after a late lifted Sugar beet crop back in January.

We took the opportunity to plant an early summer cover crop after the last silage cut on the 2-year grass ley which is now in full flower of white, violet and purple near the Church. Although we are quite confused as to why the outside few metres we only have phacelia, and the rest of the field is the mix we planted! Either a drilling issue where heavier and lighter seed has dispersed in the drill, or some pesky critter has come in from the hedges and eaten all the brassicas! It still looks very pretty all the same and great for encouraging pollinators and insects at a time when no other crop is providing a source of pollen.

The cover crops and Grass leys will all be grazed over the next few months so keep an eye out as our visiting ewes meander their way from field to field across the farm. Because we have early cover crop growth to graze this year the ewes are likely to be joined by some rams whilst they are here at Bishops farm, so not only will they leave here after a good feed they will be blessed with the next generation of spring lambs.

Mike has been busy ploughing since harvest as the wet conditions left us with deeper harvest wheeling's than in previous years. It's always a compromise having the straw baled as the big heavy baling equipment can sink in and cause compaction to the land when conditions are less favourable. However, we need some of the straw for the cattle bedding over winter and the rest goes to other

livestock farmers in the West or to the power stations to burn to generate Electricity, arguably more sustainable than burning fossil fuels however we have to then replace the nutrient removal back to our soil.

For several years, we've taken digested sewage sludge back on the farm as a readily available source of organic Phosphate, but we've been trying to work out the best way to replace the removal of potash that is largely taken away in the straw. This summer we bought a product called Fibrophos which was delivered and spread by contractors due to its large volume application rate.

Fibrophos is derived from the incineration of deep litter poultry manure, which is used as a fuel for state-of-the-art electricity power stations. The resultant ash from the furnace is pure fertiliser containing all the plant nutrients (except Nitrogen) which were present in the poultry feed. Fibrophos returns the nutrients back to the soil in the balance removed by the crops, making it an ideal environmentally friendly, natural fertiliser for agriculture. There are various grades based on the nutrient make up and we have opted for a high loading of Potash to go with the high loading of Phosphate we take in the sewage digestate. Thus balancing our offtake and hopefully enhancing our yields and productivity further in future years.

The cattle are making good gains of around 1.2kg/head/day this year out at grass. With no extended drought period this summer Mike has been able to leave them out longer with no supplementary feed just some additional haylage as the herbal leys start to slow up growing as day length declines. It won't be long until the next batch arrive on the farm after a quick trip to Penrith to assess and influence the choice of the incoming stock.

From a spraying perspective, the Autumn workload is significantly reduced compared to the spring with just pre-emergence herbicides to complete as I follow Mike around the farm as he drills winter cereals. And then aphid pressure dependent just 1 post emergence spray before I can hopefully put the sprayer to bed for another year. We change the sprayer back onto wider wheels for the autumn to allow for travelling in wetter conditions; and we have a different set of nozzles that we alternate facing backwards and forwards in order to get better coverage of the soil with our Autumn herbicides.

Farming is ever developing and as we reset the farm with new crops and new livestock, we tweak our practices slightly with the knowledge of another year under our belt.

The first week of September was a bit of an extreme; the children go back to school so the temperature soars and we had a week of blazing sunshine and hot hot days. I expect they could all explain weather patterns better than me but inevitably the high temperatures and humidity led to quite a downpour on Tuesday 12th where I recorded 26mm which fell in two almighty bursts (gutters overflowing, rain-collection points bubbling) - I gather in the centre of the village 31mm was measured so it shows how localised these things can be. Nothing since but there is plenty of September still to go.
