Editorial



Dear Friends

The beginning of September often feels like the start of a new year — and that's probably because it heralds the start of the new academic year. I'm sure there are many of you with children who can't wait for the new school term to start, or perhaps some of you who will find it hard if your child is just starting school. Letting go of our children at key points in their lives can be both exhilarating and frightening at the same time.

As I write this we are nearing the end of our (reinstated after the pandemic) annual benefice holiday club at Cockfield Village Hall. We've had around 20 children of primary school age each morning enjoying songs, games, crafts, puppetry and a drama involving the adult leaders – which always brings much laughter. This year the week was entitled 'We're going on a Safari' and has involved thinking about all God's creatures, and the love that God has for us all.

One of the things I enjoy about working with children in our primary schools (we now have Gt Whelnetham as well as Cockfield in our benefice) is the way in which children can be so honest. It's a shame that we can't always be honest as adults, but we learn as we grow that some things are best left unsaid to avoid unnecessary pain and suffering.

My hope is that by the end of the week the children will know that they are loved, by God, and by us, and that they can always rely on Him - if they choose to do so. News from Homefield



Well, it looks like Mother Nature has again sorted out the allotment for me. Looking back over our previous writings it has been rain, sunshine, hot, cold, either too much or too little, too early or too late. Then you stand and look and hey presto! (couldn't spell ta dah!!) it has come right mostly. All the early potatoes are lifted and are in hessian sacks in the container. Again Charlotte and Saxon have come out on top, both in yield and in taste. Also the slug problem disappeared after the first row. Altogether this year I planted 12 rows of potatoes, six different varieties as comparisons, including half a bag of chitted new potatoes that got lost in the back of my father in laws garage, the variety was Baby Lou. The dwarf beans have now finished, the majority being frozen down, and the runner beans have taken their place. I know size isn't everything but a 16" bean is an achievement! The carrots and beetroot have now decided to grow after my moaning in July's Grapevine. The few pumpkins are ripening fast, earlier than I remember last year and the courgettes, I swear, grow overnight. We have taken an early cut of broccoli, some of which has been frozen. The odd caterpillar may have been included but after blanching and freezing they are pretty inert. About a fortnight ago (mid-August) I planted more dwarf beans, lettuce, carrots and beetroot which should see us up to the New Year. I like to think I'm practising succession sowing but they still all seem to come up at the same time. This year I tried some seed tapes (carrots and spring onions) as an experiment. They are more expensive than a packet of seeds but germination has been more even and there is no thinning out. With the space I have I think I will stick to the packet and spread the seed further apart and save money as well. Reminds me of school experiments - Method, Result, Conclusion!

Any trimmings, overgrown vegetables etc go down to the sheep so there is nothing wasted. They do get a handful of sheep nuts to keep them coming to my whistle. Lola is very partial to older beetroot, cut into slices and hand fed! With all the red around her mouth it's hard to remember she's a vegetarian. They are all looking very well at the moment and soon it will be time to think about a ram for the lambs next year. At the moment, and touching wood, we have had no new fly strike problems. With the warm damp conditions it has been doing the rounds again. Glyn

What a difference in rainfall and temperature compared to last July! The final week of July produced another 22mm of rain bringing our monthly rainfall to 72.5mm – relatively high compared with our 30yr average of 51mm. August, so far, has had 49 mm, most of which seemed to fall in the first weekend (thankfully we were away on holiday!).

The past week or so, however, has been gloriously sunny and warm (but not too warm) and the happy roar of combines in the fields has hopefully meant the farmers have successfully brought the last of the grain harvest in.

I know I keep saying it but it's such a difference from last year. Last autumn all I discussed with fellow gardening enthusiasts was planting drought tolerant garden plants – this year we've lost a few things in the gravel garden because, with our clay soil, they haven't been able to drain quickly enough. The mowers have been kept busy but the hose pipes have remained coiled and I think I prefer it that way. The nights are starting to draw in but we mustn't be disheartened by that – the amazing East Anglian light makes September a month to relish!
